TRADE OPPORTUNITIES IN SOUTH AMERICA AND OTHER COUNTRIES

In the weekly report of the Trade and Commerce Department for January 18th, Trade Commissioner Pousette, of Argentina, states that Argentine most companies have entered into contracts to supply the British and French governments with 19,000 tons of meat a month. Hides have gone up about 40 per cent. since the war began. Mr. Pousette points out that Canadian manufacturers of rolling stock are likely to find openings within the next two years that will give them more than a fair chance to secure a footing in South America. He thinks Canada is in a better position to compete for steel rails. A big crop is looked for in Argentina, which may cause a demand for Canadian agricultural implements.

The report contains lengthy comments on trade in Australia, China and Japan, with notes on European and Foreign trade of a valuable character.

POLAND ISOLATED IN ITS MISERY

Starving population caught between two Military millstones without a neighbor to send relief.

The isolation of Poland at the present time is indicated in the story told today by A. H. Debeli, who has just reached this country after a roundabout journey from Cracow, Austrian Poland. Mr. Debeli is a mechanical draftsman who has followed his profession in the United States for several years, but he has been accustomed to visit his old home in Poland at frequent intervals.

Mr. Debeli, who was in Warsaw, Russian Poland, just before hostilities began, gives the following description of conditions:

"All railroad lines south and west of Warsaw have been destroyed since the outbreak of hostilities, the rails being carried away. Railroads running north and east into Russia from Warsaw are also blocked and are literally choked with incoming military supplies. It will be well-nigh impossible to ship anything in or out over them as long as the war lasts."

A friend of mine living in Warsaw mailed to me sixteen letters addressed to the United States on successive days, and only one mislaid has come to hand, and that after an interval of over five weeks.

"I came out of Poland by way of Austria, then to Switzerland, France, and England. At the present time there is actual starvation among the Polish non-combatants. Already large numbers of women and children have succumbed in this manner, and unless conditions speedily improve, the deaths due to starvation will mount up to a terrible figure. The distressing feature of the situation is that Poland has no neighbor with whom to ask for help. True, Austrians and Germans have attempted some measures of relief, but their own needs are such that there is little surprise for the Polish sufferers."

No One Nation to Blame.
"For the misery of these millions of people, no one nation among the several combatants can be blamed. Poland appears to be simply a pitiable victim of military necessity."

"Early in the war the Teutons invaded Poland as far as Warsaw. In order to take the Russians by surprise, they rushed along with all possible speed and without waiting for their own supplies. This necessitated living off the country. The Russians, however, were further advanced, and their preparations than the Germans and Austrians had supposed, and this necessitated a quick strategic retreat over the same country. Lines were destroyed, highways dynamited, and roads ploughed up. The country-side was laid waste. Petrograd, Jan. 22, via London, Jan. 23.—Dr. Philip Newton, one of the American Red Cross surgeons in charge of the Kiev Hospital, married the Princess Helen Schahofskaya in Petrograd today. The princess is a Russian woman who volunteered to serve as a nurse in the hospital operated by the Americans.

The ceremony was performed in the Russian church and was attended by Frank North Winship, the American consul, and Ray Baker, secretary to the American Ambassador in Moscow.

Dr. Newton explained to friends that there was not enough work to go around at the Kiev Hospital and that he had nothing to do except fall in love. Dr. and Mrs. Newton will make a honeymoon trip to Archangel, to meet two American doctors who will arrive shortly to reinforce the present Red Cross staff. Dr. Newton said that only those who are slightly wounded are brought to the Kiev Hospital, and that he hoped soon to establish a new unit at Warsaw where it would be possible to see real service.

NEVER TIME WHEN HEALTH OF SOLDIERS HAS BEEN SO WELL LOOKED AFTER

Results from inoculation against Typhoid in British Expeditionary Force astounding, noted surgeon says.

London, Jan. 22.—Sir Frederick Treves, the well known surgeon, in speaking before the Royal Society of Arts tonight said that the results achieved by inoculation against typhoid fever in the British expeditionary force have been "positively astounding." He said that since the war began there had been only 213 cases of which 173 were among persons who had not been inoculated. There had been only 22 deaths and none of those who died had been inoculated. Not a single death from typhoid fever had occurred among those inoculated.

"There never has been a time in the history of any campaign where the wounded soldiers have been better looked after," said Sir Frederick. "When the history of this war is written one of its most astounding features will be the sanitary precautions taken to secure the health of our soldiers and their cure in disease."

GOLD POOL TO BE DISSOLVED

Portion of funds unused will be returned promptly to the subscribers.

New York, Jan. 22.—In taking formal action today to dissolve the \$500,000 gold pool, organized after the beginning of the war to safeguard exchanges, the committee voted to return promptly to subscribers the unused portion of the funds. Subscribers will be released from payment of the balance of their pledges.

The improvement in the financial situation, it was stated, made the continuance of the pool no longer necessary. Of the hundred million dollars pledged, 25 per cent. was paid in. About \$10,000,000 was shipped to Ottawa for the account of the Bank of England.

THE HILYARD MILL PROPERTY SOLD

James S. Gregory New Owner of Valuable Water front.

The most important property transfer in St. John in many months was concluded this week in the purchase by James S. Gregory of the Hilyard Harbor Properties, Ltd., with a capital of \$199,000, to take it over. The deal fell through, and now Mr. Gregory has become the owner of what is regarded as one of the most valuable of the harbor properties. The purchase comprises some 330,000 square feet, with the saw and shingle mills, docks, slips, etc. The purchase is a valuable addition to the harbor properties already owned by Mr. Gregory, making him one of the largest if not the largest private owner of harbor front property, while the purchase of the Hilyard Harbor Properties, Ltd., with a capital of \$199,000, to take it over.
