Toronto, Mar. 23.—By a score of 6 to 4, Vancouver defeated Toronto in the second game of the Stanley Cup series tonight, showing a marked superiority over the N.H.L. champions on the play throughout. The game was played under western rules and the losers were manifestly handicapped. The displayed little system and their rushes were of an individual variety while the winners combined neatly at all times. The majority of their scores were earned and but for the cruel and deliberate rough play in the final session, Vancouver would probably have won further off. When the Blues realized that they were in for a beating they cast all decency aside and hurled the visitors a rough passage. Taylor was a marked man and finally he was compelled to retire, following a vicious slash over the arm from Randall's stick. The latter young player had acted of a major variety. Mummyner ran him a close second in this respect, his work being so crude that even the home fans hooted him every time he er part of the last period the Torontos were playing short-handed owing to penalties.
