### REPORT THAT PETLURA HAS DECLARED WAR ON DENIKINE.

Paris, Oct. 8. — Gen. Mangin, whose recall to Paris from command of the Eighth army has just been announced, is to proceed to South Russia and join Gen. Denikine, the anti-Bolshevik commander there, according to L'Elclair today. He will be accompanied by Basil Mikoyeff, Russian Ambassador in Paris, their mission being to co-ordinate the policy of the anti-Bolshevik Governments.

Confirmation of recent reports that Gen. Simon Petlura, the Ukrainian military leader, has declared war on Gen. Denikine, the Cossack anti-Bolshevik commander in South Russia was given to day by the Ukrainian Diplomatic Mission in London.

The Mission stated that it had received an official telegram from Kamenatz Poldolsk making this announcement.

The despatch stated that the efforts of the Ukrainian Government to avoid a conflict had failed, and that the Ukrainian population had enthusiastically received the declaration of war.
