Governor-General's Visit. The committee to arrange for the proposed visit of H. R. H., the Governor-General, met in the Council Chamber on Wednesday evening and arranged the following programme:

The royal party will then take an automobile ride, along the following route: From station to Main street, up to Linden avenue to Acadia street, to Gasperau avenue, up Gasperau avenue to Ridge Road to old Catholic burying ground, where party will halt for a view of the Gasperau Valley, thence down the hill into the Valley and up past Sir Robert Wetherbe's residence to the old church at Grand Pre, thence to the old Willows and Evangeline Beach, returning by post road to Wolfville, through the grounds of Acadia University to Greenwich, Fort Williams, Starr's Point, to Canard, Upper Dyke, to Kentville.

It is hoped that all citizens will display a liberal amount of flags and bunting along this route, that all stores and public buildings will be suitably decorated in honor of the royal party.
