FRASER DE BERRY, *Hon. JOHN.* [*Rougemont.*]

The family of Fraser de Berry is of very ancient date, and of Gaulic origin; they first came from Germany to France in 250 in the person of Julius de Berry, whose descendants became Seigniors of Troile, in Brittany. Only s. of the late Dr. Simon Fraser, who, as an officer in the 42nd or Royal Highland Regt., took part in all the engagements fought by that corps from 1796 to 1802, including the battle in which Sir Ralph Abercrombie fell; grands. of Malcolm Fraser, a cousin of Lord Lovat on his mother's side, who was an officer in "Fraser's Highlanders," fought and was wounded at the taking of Quebec, and who afterwards remained in the country, became Seignior of Mount Murray, and died, 1816. B. at St. Martin, P. Q., 25 Nov., 1816. Ed. at Terrebonne and Montreal. M., in Quebec, 1842, his cousin, Elizabeth Fraser de Berry. A notary public. Is Seignior of Contrecour and Cournoyer, Chief of the "New Clan Fraser," of Quebec, and Presdt. of the *St. Jean Baptiste Société*. Was an unsuccessful candidate, for Montarville in L.
