Some facts about your stay in Canada

If you plan to visit other countries during your stay in Canada, please note the following:

•Students who visit the United States, Greenland, St. Pierre and Miquelon do not require visas to re-enter Canada as long as their student authorization remains valid at the time of reentry;

•Students planning to visit other areas of the world may, depending on their citizenship, need a visa to re-enter Canada in addition to a valid student authorization and should contact a Canada Immigration Centre for advice.

So if you are planning to visit another country, make certain there will be no difficulty re-entering Canada to resume your studies. If there is any doubt, contact your Canada Immigration Centre.
