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- A. Oh, above over \$200.
- Q. What is the old house worth? A. About \$150. I suppose
- Q. The size of the new house?
- A. I think it is about 20 feet anyway.
- Q. 20 feet by how much? A. 20 X 19. I suppose.
- Q. And the old house?
- A. Oh, about 15 X 16, just about just looking at it.
- Q. Existing stables, when were they built?
- A. I could not say, they are pretty old.
- Q. What are they worth? A. Over \$25.
- Q. The fence I suppose is worth how much?
- A. Oh about \$30 or \$40.
- Q. Since the transfer how much land has Cochran broken?
- A. About three acres I think.Q. He has never farmed any more than that all the time since the transfer has he?
- A. Oh yes, he farms all that was cleared sometimes and this three acres, about eight or nine acres altogether.

Commissioner- Do you remember when Alexander Cochrans father died? A. No.

- Q. He was alive at the time of the treaty?
- A. I am not very certain but I think he was.
- Q. Alexander Cochran is a treaty Indian? A. Yes.
- Q. And his father was? A. Yes, if he was alive. Of course he was an Indian.
- Q. At the time of the transfer did the father and son live in the same house? A. Yes.
- Q. Was Alexander Cochran married at the time of the transfer?
- A. No,I could not say.
- Q. Did Alexander have any brothers and sisters? A. Yes.
- Q. How many? A. One is Mrs. McLeod, and another is Mrs. Hokgate---the Ferryman.
- Q. Any brothers, just tell us the number? A. I think three.
- Q. Then you say the father and son lived in the same house at the time of the transfer? A. Yes.
