- As a matter of fact you have no personal knowledge of the applications covered by this schedule which we have before us?
- A No, with the exception of Ulkatche.

Saturday September 11th 1915.

INDIAN AGENT FOUGNER: I have looked over the list of applications for the Ulkatches and I regret to say I cannot make a definite statement about them today, so I would prefer to leave the Ulkatches over with the others until my next visit to Victoria.

MR COMMISSIONER MCKENNA: I think that will be perfectly satisfactory.

MR COMMISSIONER SHAW: We sent you a copy of Capooses evidence, given before the Commission, regarding his deal for land with Mr Brynildsen?

A Yes.

- Q You read the evidence?
- A Yes.
- And so far as you know was Capooses' statement in regard to that
- A I don't think it was full; it might be misleading in this respect; an Indian by the name of Capoose was living on a piece of land at Abuntlet Lakes Me had evidently taken up this land quite a long time ago as a camping-ground which was not used only by him but was used in common by all the Ulkatchos. Then it was represented to Capoose by white people that he was not safe in living outside of the reserve and that some white man might come along and purchase or pre-empt his holdings and he would lose its I understand an arrangement was made with Mr Mowell late Commissioner, whereby permission was granted to a white man to pre-empt the land upon which Mr Capoose's holdings are.
- When you say pre-empt do you mean to pre-empt in the ordinary term of the word, or purchase?
- I mean in the legal meaning of the Lands Act and Capeose was to do what was required by the Act.
- MR COMMISSIONER MCKENNA: But Capeose had already done that?
- A Yes, I understand he had already done that.
