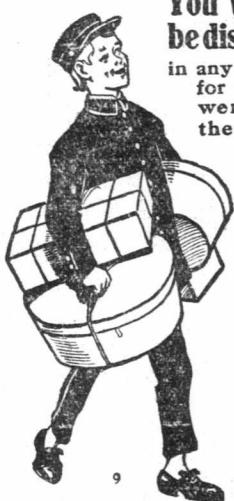

CITY COUNCIL BROKE UP WITH QUORUM MISSING

Industrial Realty Guarantee of Bonds Caused a Misunderstanding Resulting in Retirement of Several Members

Unexpected developments cropped up at the meeting of the City Council last evening whereby a number of aldermen bolted from the Council chamber and left the meeting without a quorum.

The unexpected happened when the Council hit the by-law stage of procedure which quite frequently provides rough going.

What Company Is. The Industrial Realty Company was made up of Brantford subscribers who are actuated by civic enterprise solely in forming themselves together to provide an instrument whereby it is hoped to secure new industries for Brantford.

It Broke Up. The Council was in committee of the whole at the time discussing the various clauses of the by-law.

What's the procedure, Mr. Clerk? asked Ald. Holinrake.

Business at the City Council Session Last Night.

The business of the City Council last night was necessarily light. It was light not only because of the unexpected developments in the by-law stage, when a quorum vanished as it were in a moment on the Industrial Realty company's by-law, but because it was light. Two committees presented reports, the Finance and the Fire and Light.

Increase for Mr. Henderson. The Committee on Finance submitted the following report:

1. That the Mayor and Aldermen English and Calbeck be a deputation to attend the Convention for Municipal Planning to be held in Toronto on May 25, 26 and 27.

2. That the sum of \$552.57 be paid for insurance premiums in accordance with the terms of report submitted by Mr. C. M. Thompson.

3. That this committee be empowered to introduce a by-law to provide an increase for the City Solicitor.

DEFENCE WILL HAVE SURPRISES FOR THE COURT

Becker Case is One of Unusual Interest—Verdict by Next Monday.

NEW YORK, May 19.—The opening of the defence to-day at the trial of Charles E. Becker, charged with the murder of Herman Rosenthal, promises to furnish some surprises as were sprung by District Attorney Charles S. Whitman, who completed his case against the former police lieutenant yesterday afternoon.

On the opening of court the defence made a motion to dismiss the indictment against Becker on the ground of insufficient evidence.

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Becker did have a raid at 124th street and Seventh avenue, where the alleged Harlem conference occurred.

Rockefeller Fears That His Life Is Unsafe

He Has Doubled Guards Around House and Has Flash Electric Light System Established Throughout His Entire Grounds—His Son Has Installed a Similar System.

NEW YORK, May 19.—In addition to doubling his guards from four to eight, John D. Rockefeller has had installed about the grounds of Pocantico Hills estate a system of electric lights which he can flash by pressing a button at the head of his bed.

BUSH FIRES ARE AGAIN CAUSING LOT OF DAMAGE

Hot Sun Up North and Probably Railway Carelessness Have Produced Flames Which Spread Rapidly.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., May 19.—The hot sun and dry weather of the last few days have combined to start the annual crop of bush fires and numerous outbreaks are reported from various sections surrounding the Soo.

Heavy Wind Going. COBALT, Ont., May 19.—A heavy wind, starting at dawn, fanned into flame scores of bush fires throughout the north, which have been disturbing settlers for several days.

No rain during the month, coupled with a dry April, has started bush fires weeks earlier than usual.

The Keeley, Wetulifer and Bellel mines escaped damage, but the entire force of men at the former fought hard.

Richard Smith, aged 56, who was registered at the House of Refuge as an inmate from Mt. Pleasant, endeavored at 7 o'clock this morning to cut off his earthly career by the suicide route.

SAYS HUERTA WILL BE DRIVEN OUT OF POWER

Mexican Doctor Who Made His Escape From the Capital.

VERA CRUZ, May 19.—Dr. Aureliano Urrutia, ex-minister of the interior, declares that he left the capital because he feared assassination, and in the belief that a revolt would shortly occur in the city of Mexico.

Twice arrested and hustled through the streets by American soldiers, and threatened by his countrymen, Urrutia was forced to face yesterday some of the indignities to which he subjected others while he was high in power at the capital.

Antonio Rivero De La Torre, editor of El Dictamen, who was the leader of a demonstration against Dr. Urrutia, is still held at police headquarters, charged with disturbing the peace.
