TREACHERY OF FILIPINOS

Pretending Friendship the President of Balangiga Leads Assault Killing All of Co. C. 9th U. S. Infantry—Captain Cornell Was Saturated With Oil and Burned.

Washington, Oct. 4.—Advices from Samar, Philippines, give harrowing details of the slaughter of Company C, 9th U. S. Infantry at Balangiga last Saturday. The president of the town, after making pretense of great friendship, led the assault. Hearing the slaughter Colonel Isaac Derrussy hurried to the scene with his battalion. They found Captain Cornell's body where it had been tied by the heels, saturated with oil and partly burned. Forty-five bodies had been burned in a trench, leaving seven unaccounted. In numerous instances the bodies had been badly mutilated, before being set on fire. Three hundred Macabees have been dispatched on board the Legaspi, which is delayed by a typhoon.

Gold Commissioner's Court.—Gold Commissioner Senkler signed judgment this morning in the case of Joseph Andrew Clark against J. Rutledge, D. W. Davis and H. T. Mills, the ground in question being a slide adjoining the lower half, right limit, of No. 8, Gold Run. The decision recites that Mr. Raoul Rintret, D. L. S., had surveyed both creek No. 8 and hillside adjoining on the 14th and 16th of last May. Clark staked on June 15, one Matthews having been the first locator of the claim, and the plaintiff brought evidence to show that the Matthews location was staked 1100 feet toward the creek from the claim as shown upon Mr. Rintret's plan. Continuing the judgment says:—
"From the evidence of the defendants it appears that the benches were staked opposite the lower half right limit in the 2nd, 3rd and 5th tiers, and the plaintiff in giving his own evidence stated that his location posts were in a place from 250 to 700 feet below the up hill line of the bench claim in the 3rd tier. If this were held to be a good location, it would include fractional ground between the bench claims in the 3rd and 5th tiers, and the question to be considered is whether a locator is fairly entitled to such ground under a location made in this way."
"When any piece of ground is vacant Dominion land, it should be staked with the intention of staking that piece of ground only. It can not be expected that persons staking the ground surrounded by other locations can stake it precisely, but it should be done in such a way as to show the intention of staking the piece of ground actually vacant. In this case the locator's stakes are such a long distance from the ground open for location, it is evident there was no intention on his part to stake that particular piece of ground."
"I must hold the plaintiff's location is invalid and the defendants' survey cannot be interfered with by the plaintiff. The protest is dismissed with costs."

A Famous Irish Wit.
Lord Morris, the famous Irish judge, has been dangerously ill. Fortunately the latest reports say that he is recovering. But in order to be well on time with obituary anecdotes several papers have been printing stories of this well known humorist. Among them are the following, all of course, well-authenticated, for Judge Morris more than lives up to his reputation.

It was in Lord Morris's court that one of the strangest judgments on record was once given. It was an abduction case, the offence being of a purely technical character. The judge listened patiently to the whole of the evidence, and then addressing the jury said: "I am compelled to direct you to find a verdict of guilty in this case, but you will easily see that I think it is a trifling thing, which I regard as quite unfit to occupy my time. It is more valuable than yours. At any rate, it is much better paid for. Find, therefore, the prisoner guilty of abduction, which rests, mind-ye, on four points—the father was not averse, the mother was not opposed, the girl was willing and the boy was convainent." The jury found the prisoner guilty, and the judge sentenced him to remain in the dock till the rising of the court. Hardly had he delivered sentence than, turning to the sheriff, Lord Morris said: "Let us go," and looking at the prisoner, he called across the court: "Marry the girl at once, and God bless you both."
