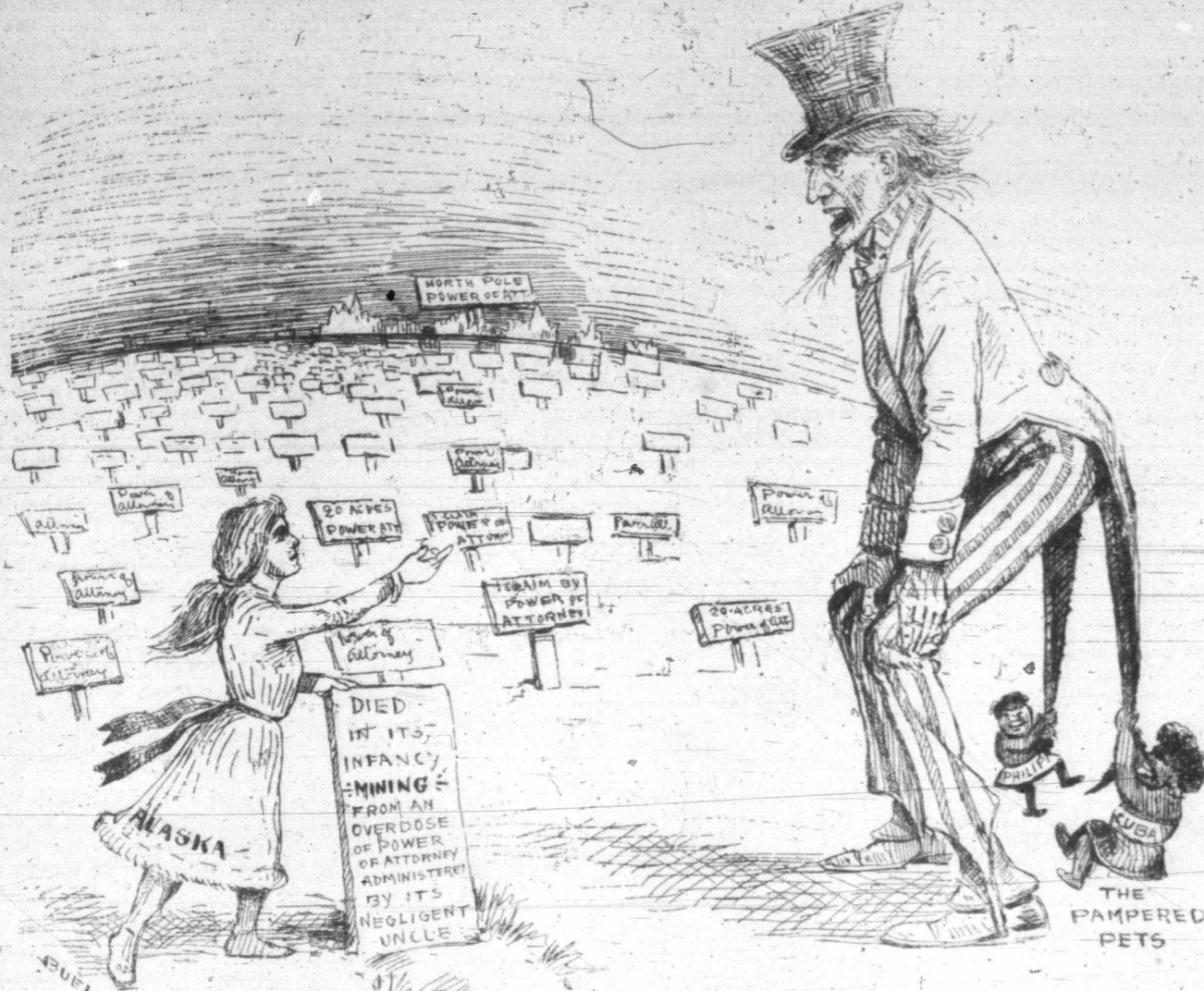

DOINGS OF SALVATION ARMY

Miss Eva Booth Tells of Her Father's and Her Own Great Work—Soap and Salvation Go Hand in Hand—Will Provide New Quarters.

Very few people have even a slight idea as to the magnitude of the work of the Salvation Army, the commissioner of which, for Canada and Newfoundland, Miss Eva Booth, is now in Dawson, a guest at the home of Governor and Mrs. Congdon, where she was seen this morning by a Nugget representative.

Miss Booth is much stronger, more vigorous appearing than when seen and interviewed by the same press representative in Skagway five years ago although in the interim she has been constantly engaged in the great work to which her life is consecrated. She is a young woman of most pleasing address, great strength of character and personal magnetism, a lady whose presence is a charm, whose every utterance is a delight.

Several years previous to the birth of Miss Booth her illustrious and world-wide blessed father, General William Booth, and his estimable wife, now dead, after devoting some years and considerable money to rescuing depraved men, women and children from the slums of London, established a sort of mission in the west end and there these agents of God were wont to teach and preach religion to a class that was without the pale of the churches. That mission was established 38 years ago and from it has grown the greatest army the world has ever known, the Salvation Army which, like the Saviour of mankind, goes about doing good in 49 different countries and colonies in which are 7495 posts and 15710 officers with upwards of 4400 lay or local officers, the converts numbering 250,000 persons each year. The Salvation Army publishes 55 different periodicals, branches of the War Cry, these publications being printed in 24 different languages, the combined issues turned out each publication amounting to 1,620,000.

In its extensive jurisdiction the Salvation Army has 13 homes for ex-convicts where they are taken on their release from prison, fed, clothed and provided with work and carefully shielded until started right in the path of life. At the home in Toronto 610 ex-convicts were cared for last year from that city and surrounding towns. Altogether 16,000

ex-convicts are annually cared for and started in life anew from these homes.

In Canada alone are 12 homes for fallen women and in this branch of its work the army is eminently successful as the reports from all its homes of this kind show that 85 per cent. of the women thus rescued remain steadfast in their resolves to lead better lives. Miss Booth is particularly proud of the work of her homes for fallen women in Canada as 95 per cent. of the women rescued remain firm in their first resolves of reformation. While many women are turned from evil paths through the influence of the Salvation Army, only a small per cent. of those rescued are taken to the homes for fallen women, yet 5,850 girls were cared for at these homes last year.

The Army also conducts social institutions, social community farms and inquiry posts, all with great success. The Salvation Army inquiry post at Dawson was instrumental in locating no less than 26 missing people last year. In large cities the Army makes a specialty of locating, rescuing and returning to their homes young girls and boys who run away. At their social institutions and rescue homes, not including their barracks, are accommodations for 33,000 people.

Statistics regarding the work of the Salvation Army flow readily from Miss Booth's lips as she was born in the work and has devoted her entire life to it, being in the line of raising up the fallen, caring for the sick, feeding the hungry and being in every sense abrahamic of God, without a peer among all the women of the earth and Dawson is indeed honored by a visit from her.

Miss Booth will not appear before a Dawson audience until Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock when she will lecture in St. Andrew's church on "The Song of the City."

Sunday night at 8:30 and in the same church she will deliver a lecture on the subject "Wanting."

As the Presbyterian church will not accommodate half the crowd that will wish to see and hear Miss Booth in Rags, her famous lecture in which she recites her experience in

the London slums, an effort will be made to secure the D. A. A. pavilion for Monday night when her famous lecture will be delivered and when she will tell about how soap and Salvation go hand in hand in the work of slumming in London and other large cities.

On Tuesday, accompanied by the local army, Miss Booth will go to Grand Forks, holding services there that night. She expects to leave for the outside Wednesday evening but in case she does not get away a grand open air mass meeting will be held on the street that night. Miss Booth brought her harp with her all the way from Toronto. She plays it in all her meetings. She has a powerful though sweet and melodious voice. She is accompanied to Dawson by a number of her co-workers, both ladies and gentlemen, among the latter being Lieut. Col. Friedrich, editor of the War Cry of Toronto. He is a brilliant talker and a genial gentleman.

One of the principal objects of Miss Booth's visit to Dawson is to secure a more centrally located site for the local barracks. More room is needed for buildings and wood yard and it is to arrange for such that she is here.
