He hu-morously remarked that if the members had stayed away the previous Sunday night knowing that he was to preach on covetousness, t would do them no good, as he had postponed his

sermon. He spoke of covetousness as the greatest sins in the world to-day and one that is doing the most harm.
"I think." said he, "that in every
nine cases out of ten sin is caused from covetousness. Drunkenness is a great sin but, saying nothing for that sin, I think that covetousness is the cause of more wrongdoing. The people are not conscious of it in many cases. It is something for which we should al-

ways be on our guard."
