### I. O. F. AT CHURCH

Rev. W. E. Knowles preached a very masterly sermon in the First Presbyterian Church last evening. The Independent Foresters, about 30 strong, attended in a body and were warmly welcomed by Mr. Knowles on behalf of himself and the managers of the church.

The preacher chose as his text the last commandment,—"Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's house," etc. Before commencing his sermon he said that owing to the meagre attendance last Sunday he had postponed this sermon until last night. He humorously remarked that if the members had stayed away the previous Sunday night knowing that he was to preach on covetousness, it would do them no good, as he had postponed his sermon.

He spoke of covetousness as one of the greatest sins in the world to-day and one that is doing the most harm. "I think," said he, "that in every nine cases out of ten sin is caused from covetousness. Drunkenness is a great sin but, saying nothing for that sin, I think that covetousness is the cause of more wrongdoing. The people are not conscious of it in many cases. It is something for which we should always be on our guard."

The order was taken to church by the regimental band, the procession being marshalled by P. Dezellia. Upon the return to the lodge room votes of thanks were passed to Mr. Knowles, the managers of the church and the choir.
