The supporters of Sir Wilfrid Laurier were not concerned with the deficit of nearly one million dollars, the result of Mr. Blair's management for 1901, but rather how they might divert the financial flow in directions which would best serve their individual political interests. Mr. Blair listened to their advice and then took a trip to New York; much the same kind of journey as he took at the time of the Clergue contract revelations. .
