Supt. Jones Says the King St. Water Connections are Being so Made. oon to the farmers as regards their

Supt Jones, iof the waterworks department says that he consulted the city engineer as to whether it would be best to take up the sidewalk or the pavement to make the connection at J. R. Reid's former store, and he said it was best to take up the pavement. The water connections are all laid to within 16 inches of the curb. When the pavement was about to be laid the waterworks department laid mains to the curb in front of all the stores on King street. The pipes, however, were not carried through to the stores, because holes would have had to be bored through the brick walls and there was no telling when the stores would want to use the water, and the expense of laying the pipes would have been great. At the time these con-nections were made it was the intention to leave the poles on the street and to move the curb out to the poles The poles, however, were moved in 16 inches. The waterworks department had intended to have movable stones could be run out from the stores and connected, and they were going to utilize the 16 inches of sidewalk that would of necessity Lave to be built for putting down these movable stones. 
