Berlin's Civic Delegation Much Impressed with Chatham's Progress.

Pay Tribute to Local Chairman of Board of Works-Some Comparative Figures.

W. H. Collard, chairman of the Board of Works, Henry Dotzenroth, sidewalk commissioner, and Civic Foreman P. R. Weber, all of the town of Berlin, Ontario, were in the city to-day inspecting the civic pavements under the espionage of Mayor McKeough, Ald. Archie McCoig, Ald. Walter Piggott and ex-Ald William Walter Piggott and ex-Ald. William

Blight.
"Yes, we're looking at your pavements," remarked Mr. Collard. "We have none in our town but we're thinking of it. We have one of the finest towns in Canada, handsome stores and fine buildings, but our streets are very poor. Just about as bad as your streets used to be here. bad as your streets used to be here. I was in Chatham some two years ago and I thought then it was the worst town I had ever struck for bad streets. We were driving on King St. down by the Gas Works and came to such a large hole we could not get through and we could not turn around. We had to get out of the rig so that it could be turned around. What a difference now."
