## SERVICES WILL STILL GO ON

Special Revival at the Park  
St. Church Will Continue  
During this Week.

Three Impressive Addresses by  
Rev. Mr. Moorehouse at the  
Services Yesterday

Rev. Mr. Moorehouse preached at  
both services at Park St. Church yester-  
day, his morning text being found in  
St. John, 18, 34-35,—"A new com-  
mandment I give unto you, that ye  
love one another, as I have loved you,  
that ye also love one another. By  
this shall all men know that ye are  
my disciples, if ye have love one to  
another."

There is a great difference be-  
tween the dispensation of the law as  
given by Moses, and the dispensa-  
tion of the new law as given by Jesus.  
The glory of the new dispensation far  
outshines the glory of the old, yet the  
old was so glorious that when Moses  
gave it his race had to be veiled. In  
fact, the people who were following  
the law of Moses were simply living  
in tradition, and the new dispensa-  
tion of God, as taught by our Saviour,  
was to undo this tradition and to  
teach the gospel. So, at the latter  
part of his ministry he seeks only to  
undo the law, and does not teach the  
gospel.

The standard of the old law was to  
love God with all the soul and mind  
and strength and thy neighbor as  
thyself. But Christ gives us the new  
commandment in which the standard  
is to love with divine love which Jesus  
loved us. This love, such as Jesus had  
is rare to-day, and cannot be produced  
of the flesh, but can only be be-  
stowed by Jesus Christ in our lives.  
This is just where the new dispensa-  
tion exceeds the old. It is in the  
character of love shown for our fel-  
lowmen and for God, and by this shall  
men know the disciples of Jesus Christ.

In the afternoon Mr. Moorehouse  
conducted a service in connection  
with the Sunday school and Bible  
classes of the church.

In the evening the text was taken  
from John 3, 16,—"God so loved the  
world that he gave his only begotten  
Son that whosoever believeth in Him  
should not perish but have everlasting  
life."

This is a very familiar text, yet it  
is deep for the human mind to  
grasp. It is a marvellous text. The  
Son of man was given that the wicked  
people of this world might be saved.  
These people are guilty before God  
and have been sentenced to death.  
Yet God so loved these wicked crea-  
tures that He sent His beloved Son  
to die for them. He loved them with  
a benevolent love. Yet the love which  
He had for His Son was a love of  
delight. So we may read, "These peo-  
ple upon whom the Son of man was  
sent to die, have been saved through the  
death of my Son. It seems a grand  
sacrifice on the part of God in thus  
giving up His Son. It is hard to il-  
lustrate. When the bridegroom,  
whose duty it is to swing the bridge  
for boats and close it for trains, has  
his bridge open and receives a message  
to keep the bridge closed so that a  
fast express containing the railway  
magnates may pass over. He starts  
to close it when he hears the express  
whistle away down the line. Just  
then he sees his son playing at the  
water's edge and dangerously near the  
slippery rocks. He shoots to him to  
keep back and goes on with his duty,  
but the child comes too near and slips  
in, and the father sees him come up  
for the last time and sink to death,  
and yet does not shirk his duty to  
save him, and the trainload of people  
are saved.

Here we have but a glimpse of the  
wonderful love of God when He gave  
up His only Son for the people of this  
world that had rebelled and rejected  
Him. This is the wondrous love that  
is reaching for people to-day, no mat-  
ter how wicked they may be.

The services will be continued  
through this week as usual. Mr.  
Moorehouse having consented to re-  
main since the work is broadening  
and the interest in it is deepening. For  
the past three weeks they have been  
conducted in Park St. Church, and  
through the grace of God, many have  
been brought to a clearer knowledge  
of God's word and of His saving pow-  
er. The Holy Ghost has been ever  
present in the meetings and great  
results have been shown, many each  
evening making a stand for the  
Lord, their Saviour.

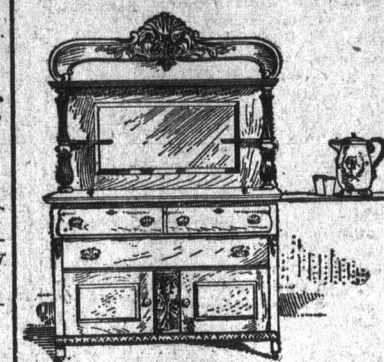
