The oldest architectural ruins in the world are believed to be the rock-cut temples at Ipsambool, on the left bank of the Nile, in Nubia. The largest of these ancient temples contains fourteen apartments, hewn out of solid stone. The largest single stone used in this work is one which forms a veranda-like projection along one side of the main temple. It is fifty-seven feet long, fifty-two broad, and seventeen—one account says nineteen—feet thick. This colossal stone is supported by two rows of massive square pillars, four in each row and each thirty feet high. To each of these pillars is attached a colossal figure of a human being, reaching from floor to roof. In front of the main temple are seated still other colossi, four in number, the two largest being each sixty-five feet high. The ruins are supposed to be 4,000 years lold. Uses of Ammonia.

Woman's Rights In Morocco.

In one large tribe in southern Morocco In one large tribe in southern Morocco woman is as free as her western sisters and the equal of her husband in every sense. Among the women of this tribe it is rare to find a woman who does not read and write, and the family property is managed by the wife and not by the husband. These women are also true amazons. They accompany their husbands on the hunt, exercise horses and camels and even take part in battles.

Use For Kerosene.

Use For Kerosene.

Few housekeepers realize the cleansing properties of kerosene. A few drops added to the water in cleaning mirrors and windows will give them a fine lustre. Applied clear with a soft rag it will remove rust from nickel and iron, dirt from painted surfaces and stains from poreclain lined sinks and bathtubs. It is sure death to bedbugs and other insects and added to the water in which clothes are boiled in proportion of a tablespoonful to a bucket of water will make the clothes beautifully white and greatly lessen the labors of "wash day." It is fine for cleaning the sewing machine, removing all that gummy, sticky substance which is such an annoyance, though the machine must be thoroughly oiled after using it, as kerosene is not a lubricant. A little kerosene—say a tablespoonful to a gallon of strong soapsuds—sprinkled on the rosebushes in the garden once a week will keen them free from insects.

Uses of Ammonia.

The use of ammonia in the household are many. In cleaning of any kind it should be used in the proportion of one tablespoonful to a quart of water. It makes the water softer than rain water. Smoky lamp chimneys, window panes and mirrors all respond quickly to ammonia. When a stain is produced by lemon juice or any other acid nothing is so effectual as ammonia in neutralizing and thus removing it. A few drops to a pint of water sprinkled on the roots of house plants will produce an abundant growth. Stains on marble can be removed by rubbing them well with a toothbrush dipped in powdered chalk and ammonia.


