Hatpin Substitute.

An invention designed to do away with the deadly hatpin has just been put on the market by a resident of Ohio. According to the inventor it consists in providing a flexible band flusk with the lower edge of the crown of the hat, this band being provided with pivot-lugs arranged along the medium portion of its inner periphery, and a plurality of inwardly foldable anchor fangs, pivotally mounted in said pivot-lugs and braced against the lower edge of said band, to prevent outward movement when placed on the head of the wearer.

Put into plain language, this means that a flexible band is sewed on the inside rim of a woman's hat, this band having downwardly projecting pins which fit into the hat of the wearer giving a secure hold. They are so arranged that they fold inwardly, so that they will never stick anyone, either in or out when not in use. They are never in view, so that the appearance and style of a woman's hat are never marred by unsightly large pins.
