SYNOPSIS OF COAL MINING REGULATIONS

Coal mining right of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the Northwest Territories and in a portion of the Province of British Columbia may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant. Applications for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-agent in the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. Royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10.00 an acre.

For full information application should be made to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, or to any Agent or sub-agent of Dominion Lands.

BIG HORSE RACE OUT AT CEDAR

FAMOUS COMEDIAN HERE ON MONDAY

Mr. Lawrence D'Orsay, who is making his Canadian tour in his famous characterization of "The Earl of Pawtucket," is naturally a comedian. He feels the parts he portrays being absolutely alone in the kind of part he plays; he carries not only the mannerisms of these favorite characters, but their view points into private life. He admires them and says, quite frankly, "that the reason he plays them so well is that he understands them."

Mr. D'Orsay is generally looked upon as the best stage representation of the British heavy swell, but the thoughtful observer of his acting must see in it a good deal more than the ponderous vacuity we involuntarily associate with that character. The fact is, he is a thinking actor. His impersonations have a meaning deeper than their superficial aspect would indicate. It is a truism that the hardest part an actor can undertake is "doing nothing." Any one can rear up and tear around and so create an impression of doing a great deal, but the actor who can make his presence dramatically felt by sheer force of cultivated repose has got a long ways from apprenticeship.

Mr. D'Orsay's work is naturalness itself, and his portrayal of an English gentleman of rank remains one of the brilliant successes of the stage.

Mr. D'Orsay and his all-star company will appear at the Opera House on Monday, Sept. 7. Theatregoers may look forward to the event of the season.

Paris, Sept. 2.—A dispatch from Antwerp to the Havas Agency reports that by decree of the government all foreigners who were not registered August 1 must leave the city at once.

London, Sept. 2.—A dispatch to the Central News from Amsterdam declares that telegrams received there from Berlin set forth that Berlin is being guarded by several army corps.

London, Sept. 2.—The steamer Eyrice, engaged in mine sweeping operations in the North Sea, struck a mine today and went to the bottom in three minutes. Six members of the crew are missing. Five were saved.

Washington, Sept. 2.—Nelson O'Shaughnessy, former charge d'affaires at Mexico City has been ordered to Vienna, where he will act as an extra secretary to the American embassy.

Paris, Sept. 2.—"In the north there are no signs of hostile troops at Arras, Lille, Bethune, Douai and Lens," according to an official announcement made today. Parts of several German army corps in Belgium are moving eastward into Germany.

Washington, Sept. 2.—President Wilson today signed the war insurance risk bill.

PLAYED INELIGIBLE MEN.
Vancouver, Sept. 2.—Having admitted playing an ineligible man under an assumed name in the final for the McBride Shield against the Victoria North Wards last spring, the Coquitlam Football Club, champions of the province, were asked to return the trophy immediately to the British Columbia Football Association.

GERMANY LODGES PROTEST.
Peking, Sept. 2.—The German legation has protested to the foreign office against an alleged infringement of China's neutrality by Japan. The protest followed the landing of a Japanese division at the newly opened port of Lung Kow, 100 miles to the north of Tsing Tau.
