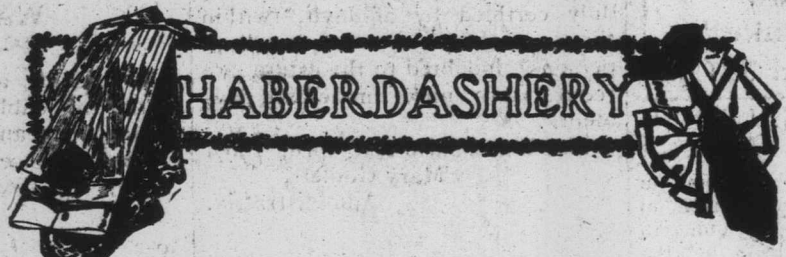

BONAVENTURE NEWS.

Bill Incorporating Bon. and
Gaspé Telephone Co. Pas-
sed Other Items

(Special to Events)

Ottawa, April 28th.—Your
reader of Bonaventure county will
be interested to learn of the public
works authorized for Bonaventure
county during last session. They
are as follows—

Bonaventure River, training
pier, \$5,000 to commence this
work. This undertaking is recom-
mended by the Engineers to scour
out and keep open the channel of
the river so that vessels may as
formerly, enter the natural basin
at the mouth of the river.

Some forty steamers and sailing
vessels called here last season.
A large fish and lumber business is
due at this point and the sale of
the Robitaille timber limits to
Senator Edwards will have an im-
portant bearing on the future of
this place and vicinity. There are
already several miles in the district

Saint Omer, (Carleton West)
This is the new parish found at the
mouth of the Nouvelle River on
which considerable lumber opera-
tions are being carried on by W.
R. McLean and others. There are
already several mills there. The
district is growing and the wharf
will serve an important locality.
The sum of \$5,000 has been voted
to start the work.

Arise a La Barbe, important fish-
ing centre, in the parish of Gascons.
There are some 50 fishermen's
boats employed in the industry
here, and last fall in one storm 18
boats were destroyed. An item
of \$5,000 has been voted to com-
mence a breakwater.

The other votes are \$4,000 for
repairs to Gascons wharf, \$5,000
for repairs to Paspébiac wharf and
\$4,000 for repairs to New Carlisle
wharf, and \$10,000 (of which \$3,000
is a revote) to complete the
Cross Point wharf.

The total votes for Bonaventure
County public works this year ag-
gregate \$30,000 besides other
works of a minor character to be
made out of the general fund.

There are also in the estimates
\$12,000 for the "Lady Ellen" and
\$5,000 for the "Marcel" the boat
which is to give a tri-weekly ser-
vice across the bay between Bona-
venture River, and Petit Rocher,
N. B.

Mr. Marcell has obtained the

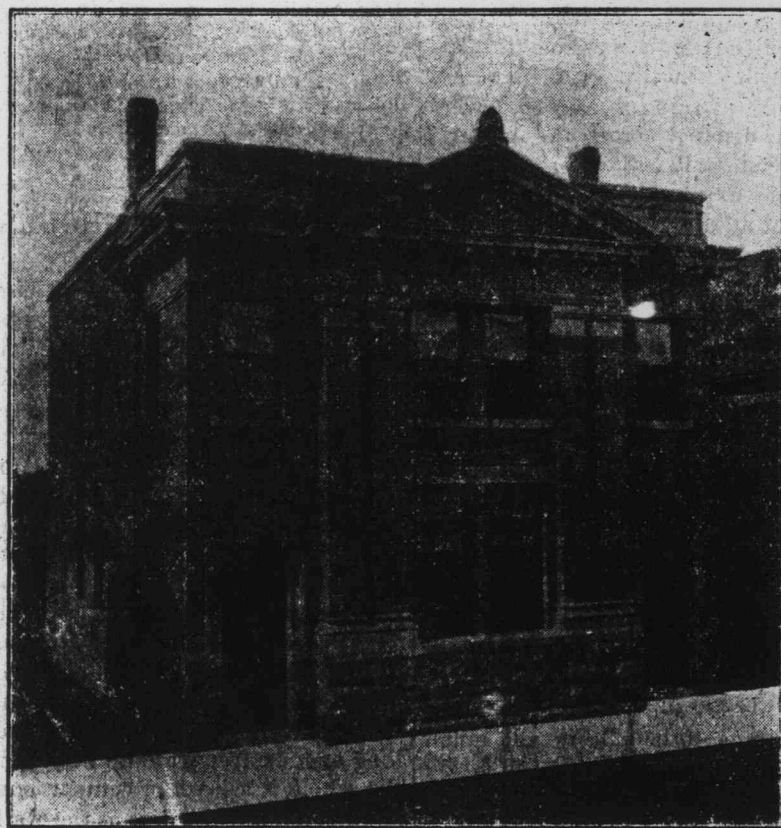

The Bank of New Brunswick

New Building, One of the Finest in
Our Town



The new Bank building on
Water Street recently erected by
The Bank of New Brunswick,
easily takes rank among the finest
public buildings in our town. It
is a handsome brick and stone
structure of modern classical style.
The facade, of Milton pressed
brick and Minnesota sandstone,
shows a middle projection flanked
by brick pilasters with stone caps,
and surmounted by a pediment.
On either side of this are the two
main entrances to the Bank; the
one on the left, leading to the sec-
ond story, the one on the right
giving access to the main banking
room. Both have vestibules with
tiled floor, and heavy oak doors
set with panels of bevelled plate
glass on which is artistically cut
the New Brunswick coat-of-arms.

The banking room on the ground
floor is a spacious apartment, 33
feet wide, 46 feet long and 16 feet
in height. The floor is of 12x12
inch black and white Vermont
marble tiles. The walls are cover-
ed with a rich dark red burlap to a
height of seven-feet, above which
they are tinted a warm terra cotta.
The heavy beamed ceiling subdiv-
ided into twelve panels adds much
to the character of the room.

The oak fittings, seven feet high
enclosing the Manager's room, pri-
vate office, compartments for dis-
count clerk, ledger keeper, teller,
and savings department, are ex-
ceptionally fine. They are finished
in a dull Old English style, and
have a base of dark Tennessee
marble. The ornamental grille
work, cages etc., are finished in an-
tique copper.

In the rear of the banking room
are a large steel-lined Safety Depos-
it vault, a book vault, toilet room,
and stationery room. In the rear
future the Safety Deposit vault
will be fitted with steel cased boxes
which can be rented by private in-
dividuals. The vault being fire-
proof, will thus afford the public a
place of safety in which to deposit
such as insurance papers, or other
valuable articles, and will especial-
ly during holiday season prove a
great convenience.

A stairway leads to the basement
which has a fine concrete floor and
contains a large storage vault.
Here also is the apparatus of an up-
to-date hot water heating system
by which the building is heated
throughout.

The second floor contains ten
offices, arranged in five suites, with
toilet room and are all well lighted.

The electrical fittings of the Bank
which are in the Mission style,
with brush brass finish, were im-

ported by Messrs A. E. Alexander
& Son.

The building was designed and
its erection superintended by Mr.
F. Neil Brodie, architect, of St.
John, N. B. and is a good illustra-
tion of the practical construction
and artistic effect which character-
ize his work.

Messrs. J. & D. A. Harquail of
Campbellton, contractors for the
work, have done their part in such
a way as to earn the warm com-
mendation of all who have inspec-
ted the building.

Mr. Wm. Perkins of St. John, N.
B., who laid the face brick and Mr.
Jos. Siney of the same city, who
furnished the galvanized iron work
have also shown themselves to be
most efficient workmen.

The new Bank is an important
addition to Campbellton's public
buildings, and it is to be hoped
that the enterprise shown by the
Bank management in erecting such
a substantial and handsome struc-
ture will meet with the reward
which it so richly deserves.

Nat McNair sells his Lum-
bering business

A. C. Dutton & Co. of Spring-
field, Mass., and Sayabec, Que.,
have purchased the N. C. McNair
timber lands with shingle and saw
mill at Jaquet River and Louison,
also the timber lands belonging to
Mr. Dutch of the same place, with
shingle and saw mill. An option
has also been secured on the W.
B. Calhoun property at Jaquet river.
In all 92,000 acres of
land and three saw mills
included in the transaction.
price paid for the McNair
Dutch properties is said to be
the neighborhood of \$40,000
the option on the Calhoun prop-
erty is placed at about \$60,000.
