Judge Snider Condemns the Race Track Pool Room.

TO THE COURT OF APPEAL.

After a long and prosperous existence, the pool room at James' track, a place where every facility was offered the sporting public for betting money on the St. Louis, Windsor, New Orleans, Hawthorne or Sheepshead Bay races, has been declared illegal by Judge Snider. The owner of the pool room, Samuel Davis, jun., was tried at the Court-house to-day on four charges which were, briefly, that he kept a common betting place, that he allowed his place to be used for registering bets, that he unlawfully kept a device for registering bets, and that he registered bets.

Crown Attorney Crear prosecuted, and Mr. S. F. Washington appeared for the defence. There was a large attendance of intenested spectators.

The witnesses for the prosecution were Wm. Hunter, now of Beamsville; Chief Twiss, of Dundas; County Constable Morrison, and Sheriff's Officer Robert Stewart. All four were at the track on Aug. 5th, the date of all the charges. Hunter testified to making a bet and seeing others make several. Mr. Davis was behind one of the wickets cashing tickets.

For the information of the court, witness explained the yay the pool-room was laid out, described the black-boards with the names of the horses running at various tracks, and the wickets through which money was paid in, and those through which it-was paid out.

FACTORY TO START SOON.

Activity at the Old Wanzer Building To-day.

MANY MEN NOW AT WORK.

MANY MEN NOW AT WORK.

There is considerable activity at the old Wanzer building, Barton street east, to-day, the place being got in shape for the Canadian Bicycle Syndicate. About 25 carpenters, plumbers, electricians and laborers are at work getting the place in shape for the reception of three car-loads of bicycle machinery, which has arrived here from the Stearns factory, Toronto. About two car-loads of machinery used in manufacturing sewing machines, which has been rusting in the factory for years, has been taken out for shipment to the mortgagee of the property.

Mr. Dodge, of the firm of Evans & Dodge, Windsor, who is one of the principals in the syndicate, has fitted up a temporary office in the building, and he was a very busy man this morning when a Times reporter dropped in. Mr. Dodge said he hoped to have the building fitted up temporarily within ten days, when bicycle manufacturing will be commenced. The work of installing the machinery will be commenced on the ground floor, and another motor will be put in the second flat. A great many new steam pipes are being put through the building for heating purposes, and in a few days from now steam will be up, and smoke will once more ascend the big chimney.

On the lower floor of the main building have here

On the lower floor of the main building, two new partitions have been put up, making three large work rooms, in place of one.
Mr. Dodge said that he expected to see 300 men working in the temporary factory before spring. A good many of these will be skilled mechanics, some of whom will probably come from Toronto and other points. The Windsor factory, he said, will be kept in operation for at least a year—till the syndicate's big factory mear Wentworth street, is finished. In the new factory a thousand or twelve hundred men will be employed. The east wing of the Wanzer huilding, the old stone part, is also being fixed up. Ten men are at work getting it in shape for the Dowswell Manufacturing Company, which is now located on Buy street. The manager of the company said to-day that the firm expected to move about Feb. list. Seventy-five hands will be employed at the start.
