#### Influence of Light on Plants.

The sensitiveness of growing plants to the influence of light, is, says the "University Correspondent," well illustrated by the results of recent research on heliotropism—the bending of stems toward light. Cress seedlings showed a distinct curvature after an exposure of only two seconds to a light of 200 candle-power. The feeblest light the longer the time required to produce a reaction, but in an hour the seedling will curve toward the feeblest glimmer of light.

#### OBITUARY.

Death of Mrs. Alex. Whyte—Mr. Stephenson's Death.

After several months of severe illness, Mrs. Alexander R. Whyte, wife of Mr. A. R. Whyte, of His Majesty's Customs, passed away early this morning at her late residence, 32 West avenue south. Her many friends will regret her death. Deceased was a kind wife and mother and a devoted Christian. She was a member of the First Methodist Church; was a daughter of the late H. S. Woodward of H. M. Customs, and she leaves a husband and one son, Alexander R. Whyte, Jr., her mother, Mrs. H. S. Woodward, West avenue south, still survive, also two sisters and four brothers. The funeral will take place at 3 o'clock Wednesday and will be private.

An esteemed and respected resident of this city died yesterday at the City Hospital in the person of William H. Stephenson. Deceased was born in Nassagaweya in the year of 1840; for a few years resided at Watford and came to this city about five years ago. Mr. Stephenson was ailing all winter, but was improving and expected to be restored to his usual health. On Sunday morning he had a stroke and died yesterday. He made a host of friends while here. He was a machinist and was the inventor of the double disc farming implement for sowing wheat in the Northwest and before his death was working on a new invention, a gas-bone line traction thresher. He leaves a widow and five sons, Charles E., of Missoula, Montana; James R., of Randall, Minnesota; John A., of Dakota, and Gustav, of Bismarck, North Dakota, and Master Russell, at home. The deceased and his family were living at 5 Homewood avenue, but the funeral will take place from 160 Herkimer street Friday at 2 p. m. to Watford cemetery.

The death occurred yesterday at her parents' residence, 365 Wilson street, of Martha M. Wade, aged 13 months. The funeral will take place on Wednesday at 3:30 p. m. from her parents' residence.

#### FIRE AT BATH.

Rochester, N. Y., April 27.—Bath, N. Y., was visited by a \$100,000 fire at 4 o'clock this morning. One of the largest business blocks in the town, the Underhill building, was almost entirely destroyed. The Steuben Advocate was burned out, as well as several business firms. The Macabee Hall on the top floor of the structure was destroyed, with all its furnishings.

Versatility of the Country Editor.

The country editor is easily the foremost man in the community. This is evidenced by the frequency and persistence with which he is asked, nay, demanded, at any time of day or night, to put up with the sick or officiate as pallbearer at funerals. The editor is always asked to be pallbearer—it gets to be a habit with him. Perhaps it is because he habitually looks sad and mournful. He feels slighted and as though he was losing his standing in the community if he isn't asked, and if by any chance he is also requested to drive the hearse the proffered honor raises him to the seventh heaven of editorial delight. An editor may be exempt from jury duty, he may not have to carry the mail, fight fires or officiate as deputy sheriff, but there is no escape from being pallbearer. Once, during a late spring when the Pale Horseman wrote circles about the hills of Old Scholastic, there were so many funerals the ministers were all busy and the editor was called away from a bitter editorial on the tariff to go and preach a funeral sermon. This was an honor that he had never dared to dream of, and he said so in strong and emphatic language, but, having done most everything else from prescribing medicine to subscribing for headstones and being a pallbearer anyway, he could not refuse. To this day the relatives and friends of Smith Van Denberg, of Cross Hill, say they never heard a better funeral sermon. It didn't bother ye editor much to deliver a funeral sermon, for he had already addressed political meetings and lectured a few times for church societies. It was no trouble to say something nice about Smith, for he paid his subscription regularly. If by chance the "boss" wasn't called away for a funeral and was seen Ann Chase going by the office on printing day, we immediately stopped the press and went out to find where the ceremony was taking place. Ann never failed to go, never got "sooped" on a funeral while she was alive, for she never missed one, and never came out unless there was one.—Don Cameron Shafer in the Bohemian Magazine for March.
