Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency of the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 90 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

In certain conditions a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—three months' residence in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted the homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

Coloring Billiard Balls Red. It often happens that red billiard balls or marbles become discolored and present a disagreeable appearance. But nothing is easier than to restore their original color. To do this dissolve some dried sorrel, after having pounded and sifted it to assure solution, in a small quantity of water, place in a porous capsule large enough to take a billiard ball. Heat this liquid till it is tepid only, and add as a mordant about 100 parts of sulphuric acid. Put the ball to be colored in the capsule and leave it there about three-quarters of an hour, on the corner of a stove, the temperature not being allowed to exceed from forty degrees to fifty degrees centigrade. At the end of that time take it away from the fire and let it cool.

The operation is complete in from two to three hours. Care must be taken to turn the billiard ball over, for the coloring is done by the action of the steam, and the bottom would be too deeply colored. When the ball is withdrawn from the liquid it only requires wiping and then rubbing strongly with a wet rag to make it brilliant again. It may be further polished by means of camellia leather impregnated with colcothar.

DECLINE TO GIVE OPINION.

Whitney Will Not Talk About Action Against Hydro.

Both Sir James Whitney and Hon. Adam Beck declined yesterday to express any opinion upon the action started yesterday by John A. Murray, of Toronto, against the Hydro-Electric Commission.

The grounds upon which the injunction is sought are: That the Niagara River is a navigable river, forming part of the boundary between the Dominion of Canada and the United States of America, and that the waters of the said river are within the exclusive control and jurisdiction of the Dominion of Canada; that the Ontario Power Company are assuming to take water and to develop power from the waters of the said river, without the sanction or authority of the Government of the Dominion of Canada, and that the action of the said Ontario Power Company in so doing is illegal and ultra vires of the said corporation.

That the defendants have assumed to enter into a contract with the said Ontario Power Company for the purchase from the said Ontario Power Company of a quantity of electrical power developed from the waters of the Niagara River, illegally taken from the said river as aforesaid, and have agreed with the said Ontario Power Company to expend sums of money in the erection of transmission lines, transformer houses, and other electrical appliances, and in the purchase of real estate and easements for the transmission of the power so pretended to be purchased, and propose, unless restrained from so doing, to spend large sums of money belonging to the Province of Ontario and to the municipality of the said city of Toronto, and other municipalities, and to pledge the credit of the said Province and of the said municipalities in the erection of such transmission lines, transformer houses, and other electrical appliances, and in the purchase of real estate and easements for the location of such transmission lines.

CONTRACT ALLEGED TO BE VOID.

And that the said pretended contract, being illegal and ultra vires of the said Ontario Power Company, is in fact and in law no contract at all, and that defendants are acting wrongfully and illegally in spending money and in pledging the credit of the Province and of the said pretended contract.

The writ of summons was issued yesterday at Osgoode Hall by Mr. Edmund Harley, Clerk of the Records and Writs, on application of Mr. G. H. Sedgwick, of the firm of Beatty, Blackstock, Fasken & Chadwick, solicitors for the plaintiff.

At Coldbrook, N. B., Hugh McLaughlin, aged 35, who had been absent from home since Monday yesterday committed suicide by drowning.

A rumor was circulated in Ottawa and other places east and west of Toronto, that the Toronto Exhibition buildings had been partly destroyed by fire.

Mr. J. J. Carrick, M. P. P., says there is not a vestige of truth in the report published in the Port Arthur Chronicle that he intends resigning his seat in the Legislature.

It is not improbable that the site of the present Central Prison may be utilized by the Provincial Government for the erection of the Hydro-Electric power transformer station to supply Toronto with its quota of cheap power.

The West Indian Club at London named Mr. Richard Grigg, Sir D. Morris presiding. The dominion note of the speeches was the expression of a desire on the part of the West Indies for closer trade relations with Canada.

Yesterday morning 1,200 Winnipeg carpenters quit work on the contractors failing to increase their pay 90 cents a day. Three firms surrendered, but building throughout the city is being handicapped, as this is the busiest time the city has known for years.

James R. Heard, splicer at the Gem Theatre, from which the fire at Hamilton's Point originated, appeared before Judge Denton, at Toronto, to answer charges of theft during the conflagration. The case was enlarged until the Sessions, Sept. 14, when a jury will hear it.

The Provincial Department of Succession Duties yesterday received the official statement concerning the estate of the late A. H. Campbell, of Toronto. The amount of the estate is \$493,000, \$6,350 of which goes to charities, Wycliffe College getting \$3,500, and the balance to lineal descendants.

A monster lobster was caught recently off Birt's Point, Prince Edward Island. It weighed fifteen pounds, four ounces when caught, and some measurements show that the tips of the outstretched claws were three feet and two inches apart, and that it would require a ring six and a quarter inches in diameter to go over its claws.

THE FORESTERS.

A.O.F. Lay Aside Fund to Carry on Large Canadian Campaign.

Sarnia, Aug. 25.—At the biennial session of the High Court, Ancient Order of Foresters, a resolution carried leaving an extra tax on all members, this money to be used in an extensive campaign covering all of Canada.

The Executive Council and officers reports showed a great increase in membership and funds.

The Dominion incorporation of the society, which makes it no longer an association, was referred to as the wisest step ever taken by the order.

The Dominion Government plan of annuities came in for warm praise.

The funds in hand are now over \$80 for every thousand of insurance.
