That of United States. Montreal, Oct. 27 .- Sir Wilfrid Laur er was the guest of honor to-day at the Montreal Women's Canadian Club lunchon, and addressed the members on British and American Constitutions-a

Victoria College, and was one of the

most successful luncheons in the history of the club. Lady Drummond occupied the chair and introduced the speaker. the chair and introduced the speaker.

Sir Wilfrid was in good form, and gave an excellent address upon his favorite topic. He paid a glowing tribute to the elasticity and adaptability of the British constitution, pointing out that it was more democratic and representative than that of the neighboring republic. The British constitution had never been congealed into writing, but was a living, flexible thing, always growwas a living, flexible thing, always growing so that it could adapt itself to the varying needs of the nation. Yet so strong and solid was it that while it had grown by evolution, the other nations of the world, after enturies of revolution

the world, after centuries of revolution and fighting, had modeled their constitutions largely upon it. It was perhaps not perfect, but it was undoubtedly the most noble code of positical wisdom ever devised by man for the government. ever devised by man for the government of man.

But while Europe was going through this period of despotism. Sir Wilfrid pointed out that the reverse conditions prevailed in England, where all the efforts of the descendants of William the Conqueror to secure absolute power along European lines were met by the nobles and people with determined, unflinching and unconqeurable resistance. The representative system gradually developed in England until it became crystallized in the Parliamentary system, the pride of British subjects all over the world, and the symbol of liberty, law and order the world over. (Applause.)

Magistrate. But the unique point was adopted, hitherto unknown, that in er-ercising this power the King must be subject to the will of Parliament. It was only in the first days of Queen Vic-

He remarked that in passing through the store all that he noticed spoke well not only for the management, but also for the deportment of the clerks. There were a few points, however, which ought to be observed. The first was punctuality, Many were a few minutes late every day. They did not realize what they were doing. It was doing wrong, and how could a person expect to advance who pursued a course which was wrong. Persons who had no ambitior should not work in a department store, where there were great opportunities for advancement. Another weak point commonly seen was the lack of courtesy. A large amount of business was lost through this, and the employees did not know how much damage they do to the firm cessful men in life are those who have how much damage they do to the firm and themselves through not being and themselves through not being cour-teous to customers. Grouching was bound to hinder the progress of the clerk. They should be pleasant, not because it was a business proposition, but because it was right.
