Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency of the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain conditions a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead right) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted the homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

NOBLE CODE OF WISDOM.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Speaks of British Constitution.

The Premier's Eloquent Address to Montreal Women.

British Constitution Compared With That of United States.

Montreal, Oct. 27.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier was the guest of honor to-day at the Montreal Women's Canadian Club luncheon, and addressed the members on "British and American Constitutions—a Contrast."

The meeting was held in the Royal Victoria College, and was one of the most successful luncheons in the history of the club. Lady Drummond occupied the chair and introduced the speaker.

Sir Wilfrid was in good form, and gave an excellent address upon his favorite topic. He paid a glowing tribute to the elasticity and adaptability of the British constitution, pointing out that it was more democratic and representative than that of the neighboring republic. The British constitution had never been congealed into writing, but was a living, flexible thing, always growing so that it could adapt itself to the varying needs of the nation. Yet so strong and solid was it that while it had grown by evolution, the other nations of the world, after centuries of revolution and fighting, had modeled their constitutions largely upon it. It was perhaps not perfect, but it was undoubtedly the most noble code of political wisdom ever devised by man for the government of a nation.

But while Europe was going through this period of despotism, Sir Wilfrid pointed out that the reverse conditions prevailed in England, where all the efforts of the descendants of William the Conqueror to secure absolute power along European lines were met by the nobles and people with determined, unflinching and unconquerable resistance. The representative system gradually developed in England until it became crystallized in the Parliamentary system, the pride of British subjects all over the world, and the symbol of liberty, law and order the world over. (Applause.)

This began to insist upon the principle that in England the King should have no power to levy taxes upon his subjects except with their own consent. This led to long struggles between the Crown and the people until the time of Charles I., when Parliament forced upon the unwilling consent of the King a statute providing that no subsidy or tax could be imposed upon merchandise, either coming in or going from the country, without the consent of Parliament. That was the first cardinal principle of the constitution, that the King could not tax without the consent of Parliament. Since then the power of Parliament has steadily grown, and with its growth had come into existence the tradition that the Commons had the initiative and power in matters of finance, and that the Lords should not change such laws, a system long recognized.

The second great principle of the constitution was that legislative power was not with the King, but with him and the Lords and Commons. This naturally led to the executive power. In any civilized nation the executive was with the Chief Magistrate, and in England the King was the Chief
