The erroneous reference occurred, had been told by several people that Dr. Moore was the superintendent, and given by Mrs. F. J. Desmond from the proceeds of her First Aid Class. statement to the Advocate reporter which justified the assumption that he was or is the superintendent of the Miramichi Hospital, and neither directly nor indirectly was he responsible for the error in the article referred to.
