## THRU RAIL SERVICE TO PACIFIC COAST

Canadian National Railways Offer Most Direct Connections With Fast Through Trains From Montreal.

The finest train service to the Pacific Coast is afforded by the Canadian National Grand Trunk "Continental Limited" now leaving at 9.00 p. m. daily from Bonaventure Station, Montreal.

The route of this finely equipped all steel train to the coast is via Ottawa, North Bay, Cochrane and via the Transcontinental to Winnipeg and by Grand Trunk Pacific to Saskatoon and Edmonton and via Canadian National Railways to Vancouver, the finest of scenic routes through the Rockies and over the smoothest roadbed.

From Maritime Province points there is connection by Ocean Limited with the Continental Limited daily and by the Maritime Express daily except Sunday. The Maritime arriv-

ing in Montreal at 7.40 p. m. affords the most direct connection, but passengers by the Ocean Limited still have the advantage of a day spent in Montreal. The Maritime connection with train No. 11 leaving Quebec daily for Cochrane at 5.00 p. m. This train makes connection at Cochrane with the Continental Limited, so it will be seen there is really a choice of two distinct routes.

## A Dangerous Practice

A matter of vital concern to all railway travellers was suggested in a letter that appeared in a recent issue of the "Montreal Star" under the heading of "The Editor's Mail." This letter was as follows:

A DANGEROUS PRACTICE.

The Editor:—There is one thing which I think should be brought to the attention of the big officials of our railway companies. That is the highly dangerous practice of smoking in sleeping cars.

In a train in which I was travelling the other night from Toronto to Montreal, I heard a porter go up to a berth and ask the occupant if he was smoking. There was a very sheepish denial, but as a matter of fact the man was smoking a cigarette—not in the smoking room, remember, but in his berth. Quite apart from the lack of consideration which this showed for the other passengers—amongst whom were several ladies—think of the danger of it, where an accidental little fire might have endangered the lives of some score more. There are enough instances on record where men smoking in bed in their own houses have fallen asleep and been burned to death, without having to emphasise the much bigger danger in a bed on a train.

I spoke about this case to the porter in the morning, and he told me that one day there would be a big fire and then people would perhaps sit up and take notice. The worst offenders, he said, are not the people in the ordinary berths, who can be asked to stop, so much as those who occupy compartments, and who can lock their doors and tell the porter who remonstrates to go to the devil.

I am not an anti-smoking crank, but I am a very frequent traveller, and I once had the misfortune to lose a relative in a railway fire, which started in a way something like this, and I am sure that if the big railway officials realized the seriousness of this they would, in justice to the travelling public, issue strict orders about it. Interviewed on this matter, a prominent railway official said that the writer of this letter had been misinformed in thinking that the matter had not been drawn to the attention of the railway companies, for it was one that had been engaging their attention for some time. They are taking every precaution possible to prevent fires, but they were hampered to a very great extent by the indifference of many members of the travelling public. He quoted one case that occurred recently in which the occupant of a compartment had set his bedding on fire through smoking in bed, a bad fire having been prevented only by the vigilance of the porter. Consideration for the safety and comfort of others—if not of themselves—would be the only method of combating this bad and dangerous practice, which, he added, seems to be growing rapidly in volume.
