

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

SENDING in the Northwest is nearly finished in some districts. There is an increase of about fifty per cent in acreage.

The first portion of the Jubilee procession in London on June 22nd will consist of the colonial premiers and escorts. Canada will take the lead.

The steamer Nor, loaded here with oats, by Messrs. Carvell Bros, has started for England. Her cargo consists of upwards of 100,000 bushels.

Twelve hundred is the number of operatives thrown out of employment by the closing of W. G. McDonald's tobacco factory, Montreal, on account of changes in the tariff.

The steamer Olivette, which arrived at Halifax from Boston on Sunday afternoon, made the run in 24 hours. This is said to be the fastest time on record between the two ports.

Word comes from Montreal that Mr. A. E. Killam, M. P. P., has been appointed inspector of bridges on the Intercolonial Railway. This is a new office established at a salary said to be \$1800 a year.

It is now thought that the session of the Dominion Parliament will close about June 10th. The Government has abandoned all legislation, contentions or not, which is likely to require much discussion.

Four wire factories have closed. Twenty two cornmeal mills are to shut up. The china industry is stopped, and generally speaking, it may be said that Sir Richard Cartwright's new line of prosperity has set in.—Mail and Empire.

A BRICK of gold weighing 355 ounces, valued at about \$7,000, was brought to Halifax the other day and delivered to George A. Pyke. This represented twenty-four days crushing at the Richardson gold mine, Isaac's Harbor.

In consequence of a heavy fog, the steamer Northumberland did not leave Point de Chene on Wednesday last. She came over early the following morning, then went back and made her regular return trip in the afternoon.

TUESDAY of last week was declaration day for West Prince, the court being held at Alberton. The returning officer declared Mr. Perry elected. The officials returned gave Mr. Perry 1614 votes, and Mr. Hackett 1527, majority for Perry, 87.

DR. WALKER, a physician of Hamilton, O., accused of mal-practice, was sentenced by Judge McMahon on Saturday last to two years and a half in the penitentiary. Bastard, a medical student, mixed up in the case, was sentenced to three years.

MONDAY was private members day in the Dominion House of Commons. At 10 o'clock Mr. Martin, of East Queen's resumed the debate adjourned some days ago, concerning the financial relations of this Province to the Dominion. He spoke at some length, supporting the proposition that Prince Edward Island had not received justice. When he closed, Sir Richard Cartwright adjourned the debate and the House adjourned.

DR. W. JOHNSON, of this city, who recently graduated with honors from McGill University, Montreal, left here for Boston a few days ago. We understand he intends practicing his profession in a town near Boston where a good opening presents itself. We wish him every success.

The parishioners of St. Malachy's, Kinross, intend holding a tea party in aid of their new church building fund on Monday July 5th next. Train arrangements will be announced in due time. This will be known as the "Diamond Jubilee Tea," and a grand time may be anticipated. Make no other engagement for July 5th.

The latest news from the east of war indicates that hostilities between Greece and Turkey are about at an end. Greece is said to have accepted the terms dictated by the powers, and to have placed her interests in their keeping, and orders have been sent from Constantinople to prevent any further advance of the Turkish troops.

An anonymous donor has sent the sum of \$27,500 to the committee of management of the charity bazaar for the Rue Jean Cousin, Paris, which was the scene of last week's terrible tragedy from fire. This amount, with the proceeds of the first day's sale \$1,800, equals the full receipts of the bazaar of 1896, and the committee is thus enabled to make distributions as before.

HALIFAX advises inform us that, a few days ago, Judge Johnson, of that city convicted John Batsefeld and Charles Brennan for robbery on the highway. They stole gold and money from the Caribou mines about a month ago. Batsefeld got two years and three months and Brennan two years with hard labor at Dorchester. But the most astonishing part of the information is that both the culprits were lately appointed by the Dominion Government to positions on the steamer Newfoundland. These must have been hushers in the handling of boodle at election times!
