WITH THE FARMERS

ALBERTA FAIRS ASSOCIATION

Calgary, Jan. 8.—The directors in attendance at the Alberta Fairs Association concluded their business by the election of officers and adopting the following resolutions: "Whereas, it has been suggested by the superintendent of the Dominion experimental farms, that this society visit the farms some time during the summer, and, whereas, a visit to these farms will be a matter of education for the farmers; therefore, be it resolved that this society ask the department of agriculture to assist in arranging an excursion, and ask the railroad for a rate, and that this convention believe the railway company should make a rate even below the usual excursion rate for such purpose.

Regulate Sale Shows.

"Whereas, it has commonly been known as fake shows at our exhibitions, to their detriment; therefore, be it resolved, that the ordinances be so amended as to give agricultural societies power to regulate this nuisance, not only on the grounds, but also within a radius of 300 yards from the grounds.

Government Appropriation of Money.

"Whereas, it is deemed to be in the interest of agriculture, to the detriment of the agricultural feature, we wish to express our approval of the efforts of the department of agriculture to minimize this habit from the fairs.

Successor to Greenway.

"Whereas, the government of the Dominion of Canada has appointed a railway commissioner to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the Hon. Thomas Greenway, we, the Alberta Exhibitors Association, hereby request that the vacancy be represented by a western man, do hereby endorse the name of A. G. B. Pomeroy, Pomeroy Man, for that position.

Resolved, that copies of this convention be fully printed, and sent to each exhibition society.

"Whereas, in certain districts, interest in different breeds is maintained, the present one judge system is not considered satisfactory; we would urge that the Department of Agriculture support the separate breeders, when requested by the society.

"Resolved, that the society recommend all exhibition societies to enforce the placing of winning tags on the stock before leaving the ring.

"Resolved, that the fourth annual exhibition convention place on record their thanks to the Department of Agriculture for the kind consideration and encouragement they have rendered the exhibition society."

AYRSHIRE CATTLE SALE.

The sale of Ayrshire pure bred stock by A. H. Trimble, held over in the last week of December was a most successful one, in spite of the severe weather, the day being one of the best of the season. There was a goodly attendance of settlers from the surrounding country, but, owing to the cold, there were few outsiders. The bidding was keen and spirited and was not allowed to lag. S. W. Paisley acted as auctioneer, and gave the following results: 1st prize, \$100.00; 2nd prize, \$75.00; 3rd prize, \$50.00; 4th prize, \$25.00; 5th prize, \$10.00; 6th prize, \$5.00; 7th prize, \$2.50; 8th prize, \$1.25; 9th prize, \$0.62; 10th prize, \$0.31.

Provincial Seed Fair.

Arrangements are completed for the third annual provincial seed fair for 1910, which will be held in the Drill Hall, Calgary, on February 23, 24th and 25th, under the auspices of the Provincial Department of Agriculture. The prizes to be given to grain growers are said to be the best ever offered at any western seed fair. For Alberta Red Winter Wheat, Banner Oats, and any other good milling variety of oats, cash amounting to \$60 in all classes is offered, divided into \$20, \$15, \$10, \$5 and \$2.50 prizes. The money offered for Red Life Spring Wheat any other hard variety of spring wheat, up to \$500 is offered, divided into \$100, \$75, \$50, \$25, \$10, \$5 and \$2.50 prizes. For six-rowed varieties of barley, divided into \$15, \$10 and \$5 prizes. The prize list also provides for prizes for peas, flax seed, timothy seed, clover seed, ryegrass seed, alfalfa seed, and any other good seed. In each of these classes, the total amount offered is \$250, divided into \$125, \$100, \$50, \$25, \$10, \$5 and \$2.50 prizes. Prizes are also offered for competitions in judging wheat and oats and for the identification of weed seeds as follows: \$10, \$8, \$5, \$3.

AGRICULTURAL CAMPAIGN OPEN

H. A. Craig, superintendent of fairs and institutes for the provincial agricultural department, returned on Saturday from Calgary, where he attended the annual convention of the Agricultural Fairs Association and of the institute workers of the province. To a Bulletin News correspondent, Mr. Craig expressed his pleasure at the good attendance of representatives at both conventions and at the important matters relating to agricultural work that were brought under consideration. "In four years," said Mr. Craig, "the Fairs' Convention has grown from eight to fifty delegates. At the first session, held in the Alberta Hotel, Calgary, four years ago, the dates of fifteen fairs were arranged. Now there are 40 agricultural societies for which fair dates had to be arranged, and this, in addition to other matters that have found a place on the program, has extended the convention to two full days.

GERMAN-CANADIAN TREATY.

Manufacturers in the Kaiser's Land Desire Business Connection With Us. Berlin, Jan. 9.—The Cologne Gazette publishes the following letter from a Crefeld firm: "A few days ago you stated several manufacturers were desirous of opening business connections with Canada, but received refusals from purchasers on the ground that they could buy cheaper owing to the differential duty in other countries. We, also, a few years ago, did an excellent business with Canada, but we have gradually lost it. We manufacture a special class of goods which Canadian customers could buy hardly anywhere else but in Crefeld, but which, in consequence of the twenty per cent. extra duty on silk goods, they eventually had limited from our patterns in England and Switzerland.

To Quash Prohibition in Alabama.

Montgomery, Ala., Jan. 10.—With a view to annulling the Alabama Prohibition law, the Cook Breeding Co. of Evansville, Indiana, moved in the United States court for an injunction to stop the operations of the act on the ground that it was illegally passed, and its effect is to cost the petitioner the sum of \$100,000. The court has granted the injunction, and the act is now null and void.
