

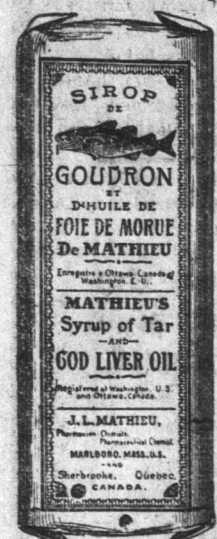

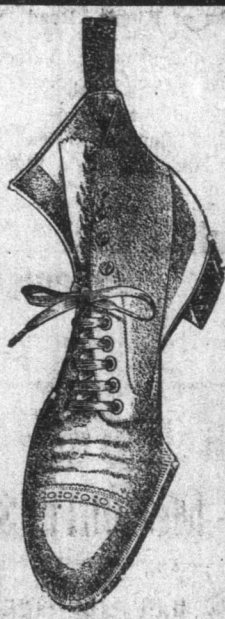

HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

Whitewash will stick better if salt is mixed in it.

Tartaric acid may be used to remove iron rust from fabrics.

An excellent cleanser for tan leather is a little turpentine on a flannel rag.

Olive oil, followed by a brisk after polish, is very good for patent leather shoes.

Fine work that imposes any strain on the eyes should never be done by artificial light.

Salt, placed on the coals when the

meat is broiling, prevents the dripping fat from blazing.

Salt water is the best and simplest solution known for cleaning willow-ware and matting.

A green mayonnaise, to be used on a salad of vegetables, may be made by adding chopped parsley.

A porcelain tub or sink may be thoroughly cleaned with a flannel dipped in spirits of turpentine.

Oatmeal should never cook less than hour, and it is much better if left to simmer all night.

Fresh chocolate stains should be soaked in lukewarm water, after which they are easily washed out.

Never stand a broom in a corner; tie a piece of string around the handle and hang it up.

To remove stains and discolorations from tinware, try rubbing with a damp cloth, dipped in soda.

Olives and English walnuts ground together and moistened with mayonnaise make a good picnic sandwich.

Yellow spots on clothing are often due to acid; try immersing them in a weak solution of ammonia and warm water.

Wet shoes should be stuffed with paper, which will absorb the moisture and prevent the shoes from getting hard.

Summer curtains of a cross stripe are preferable to Swiss, as they keep fresh longer and are easily laundered.

Good black ink, mixed with the white of an egg, is excellent to restore the color of black kid gloves or shoes.

When ironing, have a cake of laundry soap handy. If the iron does not run smoothly, run it lightly over the soap.

For relieving the pain of a sunburn, a paste of talcum and cold cream, mixed well together, will be found helpful.

Cold cereals, like the various flakes, are much improved by the addition of fresh fruit with its natural juices.

A New X-Ray Martyr.

Dr. F. S. Pepperdine, the latest X-rays martyr, whose claims to a civilian pension are now being considered by the Government, is one of the most massing of men, in whom a casual observer would not expect to find a hero of science. He was seen at his home in Bexhill-on-Sea last night, sitting beside a large fire warming his amputated left arm, which, he explained, felt as if it were frostbitten. Otherwise Dr. Pepperdine was quite cheerful.

"I commenced lecturing and demonstrating," he said, "in 1897. Since then I have been experimenting with the X-rays. It must have been in the early days of those experiments that I first contracted the disease. It manifested itself by irritation of the skin and a burning sensation. That went on for years. The skin of my left hand began to ulcerate and break down, and the pain was intense. Until I had it off I could not sleep without opiates."

Much of Dr. Pepperdine's work has been gratuitous, and to his devotion towards poor suffering humanity he owes his present misfortune. "I have made it my practice," he said, "never to take a fee for any work unless the patient could afford it."

His anxiety now is that others shall not fall victims to this science. "My own belief," he remarked "is that all the effects of X-rays can be eliminated now that we understand them. The only danger I see at present is in the effect of the rays on the brain. Large numbers of London school-children are treated with the rays for ring-worm, and it is possible that harm may be in that way done to the brain. I am at present experimenting with a well-known pathologist to see if we can ascertain the real effects of rays impinging on the brain. We can take photographs through the skull to such an extent that we know as a fact that the rays are absorbed by the brain matter."

Dr. Pepperdine's right hand is also now affected, and he has been compelled to give up his practice. He has a wife and five children dependent on him. —Daily Mail, July 24.
