CHENG-TU, China, Jan. 2. Three hundred Chinese soldiers were killed by a force of Thibetans near the border during a night attack. It is reported that the Chinese troops also lost six machine guns. The official reason given for the defeat of regular troops is that the soldiers, refusing to trust their commanders' knowledge of the country, became insubordinate. During the confusion which ensued, the Thibetans seized the opportunity of attacking the column, which they totally defeated.
