## Notes of Long Ago.

L. C. MORRIS. CHAPTER XIV.—THE SOLDIER LAD.

Our lad from Sunny France was a hero in many ways, and though he broke his ship's discipline, his career afterwards was in his favor, and he proved worthy in his day and generation.

Like him, our story to-day, is of another lad; but one whose life was different from his. Our soldier lad was of the old school, and his record was made before the introduction of steam, or the advent of railways; and when army life was very different from what it is to-day, because modern invention and scientific improvements have so completely changed the life, as to have robbed it of much of its romance. This is seen in every department of industry, and especially so in warfare. Our story to-day dates back a full century, when wooden sailing ships comprised the fleets of the nations, and when Nelson's old Victory was the wonder of the Mediterranean; so that the conditions under which our soldier lad served, and under which he saw active service on the battle field, were very different to what the position would mean to-day. When he told me the story he was about seventy years of age or more, and it is fully forty years since that time, and he being about the years of age when he enlisted, our readers will be able to turn up for themselves the pages of history, and see what was really took place at that time on the European Continent, and through which our hero came without wound or injury; notwithstanding the grim fact that tens of thousands of men fell on the field where he was, and thousands were wounded at the same time.

At the age of seventy, he was a bright-eyed, well spoken gentleman, and was very sharp of intellect; and if he looked at life all through his career as it impressed me he looked at it as he told his story, then he certainly did get the best out of it. His circumstances were very humble, his house lowly and thatched, but his heart was bright, and his heart was open to his fellowman; and it was because of his genial conversation that I became so interested in what he was saying, not dreaming of ever writing it. But now that I put those stories into print, among the list of the many which I possess, this one of the soldier lad is very vivid in my memory. Through all his years in Newfoundland, and through which he and honest and gave to our country the best asset that any man can give—the asset of honest toil and simple faith. And so we will tell the story like the man himself, simply and plainly, and put it in his own words, as near his words and sentiments as is honorable and right.

"My father was born near Dublin, and was a soldier in the English Army. He enlisted when quite young, and also married young. I was his only son, and at the age of twelve I was admitted in his same company."
