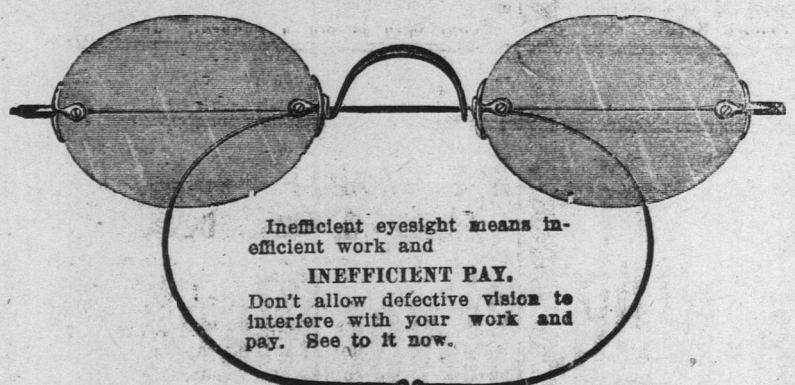

BOTHA'S FORCES IN GERMAN TERRITORY.

LONDON, To-day. The execution here in military circles is that a combined land and sea attack on the Dardanelles will begin shortly and that at the same time Russian will bombard Bosphorus. In Africa Botha's forces continue the victorious march along the railways, but thus far they have been unable to overtake the main German army which it is thought here is trying to draw the old Boer General as far from his base as possible before making a stand.

EARL AS A PRIVATE.

LONDON, To-day. Earl of Crawford just enlisted as a private in the Royal Army Medical Corps for the duration of war.

CLOSING THE DEE AT NIGHT.

WASHINGTON, To-day. The River Dee and the Port of Chester have been closed to all navigation by night on the order of the British Admiralty. The State Department has just been informed from London. The message said no vessel is permitted to leave or enter either place between dark and daylight and that all navigation lights have been extinguished. No explanation of the order is offered.

AUSTRIA SAID TO BE SEEKING PEACE.

TURIN, To-day. The Gazette del Popolo, declares the report that Austria is seeking peace with Russia in order to defend herself against Italy, is not so visionary as the official communication issued at Vienna would indicate. The correspondent of a paper at the Austrian capital professes to have obtained reliable information to the effect that the Austrian Government already has opened semi-official pour-parlors with the two powers of the Triple entente, and he believes a dramatic surprise is possible.

KAISER THREATENS ITALY.

What the Kaiser thinks about Italy is reflected in the following statement he recently made to officers attached to the Austrian Emperor's suite: "Even if we are crushed we shall never tire of telling our children in Austria as well as Germany that our downfall was due to Italy. If it takes us ten or even twenty years we will win back whatever we give Italy now, and also seize Venice as interest." This disclosure was made to a neutral newspaper man by an Austrian officer who heard the Kaiser's vow.

HEAVY FIGHTING AT NEUVE CHAPELLE.

LONDON, To-day. A despatch from Amsterdam says that fighting is still proceeding in the neighborhood of Neuve Chapelle. The Allies' artillery is bombarding the villages of Fecomes and Herles. The Germans have delivered numerous counter-attacks, especially at night, but have been consistently repulsed. The artillery fighting in Fecomes region is stated to have been particularly violent. The Germans attacked at this point in close formation and were supported by artillery, while four aeroplanes dropped bombs on the British positions. The German infantry is said to have suffered considerable losses. Strong German attacks near Armentieres, according to this despatch, have also failed. British warships continue to shell the Belgian coast, supporting the Allies' land operations. The Allies are delivering infantry attacks regularly.

RUSSIAN SUCCESSES IN CARPATHIANS.


LONDON, To-day. The Daily Telegraph correspondent at Petrograd telegraphs that Russians won a very important success in the Carpathians on Sunday. Here the troops fought their way over a ridge to a point due south of Gelagrod, and they are now driving the Austrians down the Hungarian slopes of the range.

Gruesome Find.

BODY OF MRS. EDWARD LANDY FOUND IN QUIDI VIDI LAKE THIS MORNING.

A solution to the mysterious disappearance of Mrs. Edward Landy, who has been missing for practically six months, was arrived at this morning when her body was found in the waters of Quidi Vidi Lake. Last evening, Mr. James Haine, Quidi Vidi, on his way home from town, was passing along by the N.E. section of the pond, near Pleasantville, when he observed in the pond, close to the shore, something of a human character. He stopped for a while but did not go to make enquiries. He proceeded home and told some of his friends, men and women, that he had seen a strange object. At daybreak this morning, Mr. Haine, accompanied by several people of the village, started out to investigate. Walking along the side of the Lake, just below what is known locally as "Peter's River," they were dumfounded to notice lying on the bottom in shallow water, about five feet from the shore, the body of a woman. The corpse was immediately taken ashore to await further instructions. Just then milkman Martin, of the White Hills, came in sight with a team, and informed of the gruesome find. Martin drove off to the city and hurriedly acquainted the East End Fire Hall guard, who in turn communicated with Mr. Gimmes, Supt. of Police. The latter despatched Constable Woodford to look after the body while he engaged Undertaker Martin who conveyed the dead body to the morgue, where it remained for identification. Mr. Edward Brophy, of Colonial St., on learning of the matter, called at a mortuary and identified the dead body to be that of his sister, Mrs. Landy, who left her home on Colonial Street at 6.30 on a Sunday evening, of October 19th last and never turned up afterwards. It is now supposed that she wandered towards the Lake, went into the pond and never turned up. When found her body was very little decomposed, being frozen and kept preserved by the icy cold water. Her features were easily recognized. Dr. Brehm examined the body and gave a permit for burial. At 2 p.m. to-day Undertaker Nyberg removed the body to the late home of the deceased, who was a widow, and is survived by three children, a father, brother and a large circle of relatives and friends, and to all of whom general and sincere sympathy will be extended.

Lintrose Crew Coming.

Mr. J. N. Johnstone, General Passenger Agent of the Reid Nfld. Co., is in receipt of a message saying that five officers and thirty-two men, the crew of the S.S. Lintrose are leaving Petrograd to-day. They will come by way of Christiania and Glasgow. In the message the Russian Government expresses its appreciation of the services of the men of the Lintrose, whose work has been done in a most satisfactory manner. Should prompt connection be made the crew of the Lintrose will arrive here within three or four weeks.

A Modern Bluebeard.

THREE WIVES FOUND DROWNED IN BATH TUB.

London, March 23.—Charged with the murder of three women, George Joseph Smith, in the Bow Street Court to-day, heard Public Prosecutor Bodkin declare he had made away with three of his wives, the crime in each case being committed shortly after he had married them. Each of these women was found dead in her bath; consequently the case has come to be known as the "Brides in Bath" case.

Smith has described himself as a man of independent means. According to the evidence of Scotland Yard, which has been enquiring into the deaths of these women, Smith made use of various fictitious names in his matrimonial ventures. The women he married were found dead a few days after the ceremony. Verdicts of accidental death have been returned, but now certain of the bodies have been exhumed with the result that the charges of murder have been preferred.

The police prosecutor gave the names of the three women and the dates of the alleged murders, as Beatrice Mundy, July, 1912; Alice Burnham, December, 1913; and Margaret Lofty, December, 1914.
Smith, according to the police, was born in London, the son of an insurance agent and is 45 years of age. Prosecutor Bodkin said the accused had been married five times in all. His first wife was Caroline Beatrice Thornhill, whom he married in 1898, and who is now on her way to London from Canada.

The prisoner will now be charged with the murder of three of these five women," Mr. Bodkin continued. "The case is remarkable for the greed for wealth which was the dominant motive in the taking of these three lives. We shall show that at the death of two of them £2,800 (\$14,000) was obtained and that the prisoner when arrested was in a fair way to obtain £700 (\$3,500) more."

The prosecutor related how Smith had ardently courted each woman and had obtained from each a will making him the sole legatee.

"In the death of these three women precisely similar circumstances existed," Mr. Bodkin went on. "Each was found in her bath; each died of drowning, and each was first discovered by the prisoner."

The prosecutor said he considered it remarkable that the prisoner had been able to face the coroner's juries untrapped after each death, and that he should only at the last have been brought to court on a technicality regarding the use of a false name in an application for a marriage license.
