ATHENS, Nov. 15. The Government in an official an nouncement, virtually admits the defeat of the Venizelists in the general lections throughout Greece yesterday. It says it will await the final results and then in conformity with onstitutional principles resign before the conclusion of Parliament.

BRITAIN IS NEUTRAL.

As Great Britain has never recognized the Wrangel Government in with negotiations aiming at the opening of trade relations with Soviet Russia, the British Navy will continue observe strict neutrality in the Black Sea, it was stated to-day. Rerts from Constantinople that the British Navy would assist in the blockade of the Black Sea ports were lenied by the Admiralty. British ships ave not yet been called to transport refugees from the Crimea, and the Admiralty said to-day it had not been decided whether they would assist in getting refugees away.

SEBASTOPOL SURRENDERS. CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 15.

Sebastopol surrendered to Russian Soviet forces at five o'clock Sunday evening after evacuation plans had been fully carried out, according to word received here to-day. General Wrangel, it is stated, was the last to eave, going aboard the cruiser arnlioff cheered by his troops.
