While Flying. Now Comes the "Aerial Mail," Sponsored by Lord Northcliffe. London .- The latest thing in the field of journalism is the Aerial Mail. a daily newspaper, which is edited, printed and published from an airplane in flight. The Daily Mail, which is sponsoring the idea, says it will contain the latest British and Continental news, political, financial and general, received both at the moment the airplane takes off, and while it is flying, sent by wireless. A special printing plant has been installed and newspapers will be distributed by means of parachutes dropping the editions into the towns over which the airplane flies. There probably will be editions for Boulogne, Rouen and Amiens, as well as for Paris and London. Airplanes will leave Paris and

London, the one leaving Paris to print the Aerial Mail in English and the one from London to print it in French

The newspaper will contain market quotations, racing results and more or less general news from all principal capitals. It will have four pages and will contain advertising as well as "feature" articles.

Men back of the project say that the public is as dependent on newspapers that there is a field for such ervice as they propose, but that if the present newspaper service is to be improved it can be achieved only by use of the airplane.

A Chemical Eve. "Give us a light that we can see and that the enemy cannot."

Such was the amazing demand of the United States Government, and it has been met by Dr. R. Woods, a Baltimore scientist.

There are as many different invisible light rays as there are visible ones in the spectrum. Ultra-violet rays are just beyond the violet, which are the last rays in the spectrum that can be seen by the human eye.

A new machine invented by Dr. Woods produces invisible rays, and includes a wide angle telescope device, which has been called a "chemical eye." through which these rays become visible, taking on a phesphores cent appearance.

The "chemical eye" will be used by warships, airships, and land forces to receive invisible signals transmitted by ultra-violet rays generated by a mercury lamp.

Ity means of this device a room can be made luminous, with no source of light visible.
