### Report of Fire Patrol of Newfoundland

The following is a report of the  
Nfld. Fire Patrol Committee which  
has been received from Mr. L. R.  
Cooper, the Secretary:—

The annual meeting of the Fire  
Patrol was held in the Department of  
Agriculture and Mines on the 21st  
inst., when representatives of the var-  
ious Companies operating throughout  
the country met to hear the annual  
reports and statements. The meet-  
ing was also attended by several  
gentlemen from St. John's interested  
in the prevention of Forest fires. The  
Fire Patrol of Newfoundland has been  
in existence for fifteen years and  
during that time, a progressive policy

as regards the most effective method  
of fire fighting has been carried out.  
During the past year, the Patrol was  
extended for a distance of nearly one  
hundred miles, and now no less than  
three hundred and eighty six miles  
of railway lines are under constant  
patrol. During the past season four  
hundred and fifty-three fires have  
been reported. This is a consider-  
able increase over last year, but for-  
tunately very little material damage  
was done, thanks very largely to the  
effective work of the patrolmen. The  
financial help given by the Govern-  
ment backed by the subscriptions of  
the various operating Companies has  
enabled the increased cost of the  
Fire Patrol to be met, and the Com-  
mittee in charge of the operations  
gratefully acknowledge the ready and  
willing help given by the officials of  
the Government Departments con-  
cerned, and also by the Officials of  
the Railway.
