A message from Honolulu reports that several conferences have taken place in the cruiser Seattle, the administrative flagship of the United States Fleet, on the question of drink for American sailors during the forthcoming visit of the fleet to

The result of the conferences is that the sailors will be permitted to avail themselves of wet privileges ashore on condition that they behave themselves and respect the

Officers of the fleet declare that the conduct of sailors is always better in wet ports because in these they are less likely to obtain poisonous liquor.

Meanwhile arrangements are being made for roving motor patrols to remove sailors requiring attention. These will be taken to temporary camps for recovery. Only serious cases will be conveyed to their ships.



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
