The Irish Church Commission.
The Freeman's Journal is in a terrible state of mind respecting the appointment of the gentlemen who have been chosen to act on the Government Church Commission. It is a state of mind which is a mixture of anger and mortification in our contemporary's elaborate and rather clumsy attempt at irony. The Freeman affects to regard the publication of the names of the Commissioners as "the greatest practical joke that has been successfully played on the Dublin press for a century of years," and apologizes for having fallen into the trap and unconsciously deceived the public, and does an injustice to the government by the publication of the list in its columns. This is doubtless considered a vastly clever and wittingly sarcastic method of discrediting the commission, but it is not likely to influence any fair-minded and dispassionate man. The object of the Freeman's Journal to the constitution of the commission is that four of the gentlemen named are members of the Defence Committee of the Church Institution. It is not alleged that they are wanting in intelligence, in character or in position—these are qualifications which no journalist would have the hardihood to deny to such men as the Right Hon. Joseph Napier, Col. Robert Adair, Viscount de Vesci, and Mr. Evelyn Philip Shirley. The one insurmountable disqualification in the eyes of the Freeman is that they are protestants, attached to their church, anxious for its maintenance, and decidedly opposed to its spoliation. Now as the commission was appointed, not for the purpose of making out a case to damage the church like the mock "commission" of our contemporary, but to enquire and report on the existing condition of the establishment, we do not see how the sincere protestantism and loyalty of four of its members can be regarded as a valid objection. There are other members of the commission equally strong liberals, and one of them at least, Mr. Oliver, the member for Hereford, holds opinions closely bordering on radicalism. They are all men of honour and integrity, and we have no doubt will carefully inquire into and truthfully report upon the subject they have been appointed to investigate. It may be safely assumed that any commission appointed by the present government would incur the hostility of the Freeman. The commission which would be thoroughly satisfactory to our contemporary should be composed either exclusively of Roman Catholics or of protestants known as determined opponents of the connection church and state in Ireland. Our contemporary is not so simple as to expect that a conservative government would pass a commission to report against the church, nor can he really believe that the nomination of three or four friends of the church as members of that body will be regarded by reasonable men as a serious objection.—*Saunders' News.*

HON. MR. The whole sum and substance of the matter with Ireland was, that money went out of the country, and did not come back to improve it, the consequence was that the people lived on a diet which would not be tolerated in Canada for a week.
