The Westworth Reform Picnic.
We have already briefly referred to the
Reform Picnic held near Ancaster, on
Friday last. Although the weather was
bad, the re-union was a great success,
there being over 1500 of the year-
many present, with their wives and
families. The chair was occupied by
Henry Hall, Esq., of Binbrook. On the
stand were the members for the County
— Messrs. Rymal and McKim, of the
Dominion House of Commons, and
Messrs. Sexton and Christie of the On-
tario Legislature. There were present,
also, no less than five Reform members
of the House of Commons from a distance,
viz.: Mr. Alexander McKim, M. P.
for Lambton; Mr. W. Fyfe, M. P.
for South Waterloo; Mr. W. Fyfe, M. P.

All these gentlemen gave addresses. One
of the most pleasing features of the day
was the presentation by the Reformers
of the Riding of a splendid gold watch
and chain, which cost \$250, to Mr. James
Somerville, editor of the Dundas Banner,
as a slight token of their appreciation of
the long and faithful services he has ren-
dered to the Reform party. Mr. Som-
erville well deserves all the Reformers gave
him, and he heartily congratulated him
upon this recognition of his services by
his friends in Westworth. He has
fought long and earnestly for the triumph
of his political principles and the success
of his party, and richly merited the valu-
able compliment that has been paid him.
Of the speaking we have only room for
the following speech by our member, Mr.
Sifton, M. P., who spoke as follows:
He complimented the Reformers of West-
worth on their fine turnout that day, on
their spirit displayed at many an election
contest, and the trusty representatives
whom they sent to Parliament, both general
and local. Not one in the House of Com-
mons, he could assure them, better com-
prehended his attention than did Mr. Rymal,
when he rose to speak. He only wished
that Mr. Rymal would come out oftener,
which perhaps he would after this. An ex-
traordinary state of things had prevailed at
last election. There were all manner of
men out—moderate men, no-party men,
Coalitionists, and what not. The most re-
markable circumstance was, that there were
no Tories. (Great laughter and cheers.)
The country, he said, then literally swarmed
with deceivers, and with men whose actions
had grievously belied their promises.
There was a necessity for the Coalition of
1854; a great work had to be done, and it
was done; but for the pretended Coalition
of 1857, there was no excuse whatever. It
had its basis only in the selfish and merely
personal aims of the men who composed it.
Mr. McDougall said at Toronto he felt his
duty to stick to the coalition ship. It was
now seen what he stood for. As for the
work of the coalition of 1854, he would illu-
strate it in this way: A respectable, well-
behaved farmer might have a very disagree-
able and disreputable neighbour, whom he
did not like to associate with, but circum-
stances might compel him to join with his
neighbour in the putting up of a fence—
there might be no resource but to do so.
That done, however, he would desire to
keep himself to himself afterwards, and this
was exactly what Reformers had done—
they joined the Tories to create a new gov-
ernment, but they held that with the inaugu-
ration of the New Dominion the partner-
ship was ended and they had no desire to
renew it. All the evils they had prophesied
as likely to arise from presiding coalition
and combination governments had come up-
on the country. Extraneous, corrupting
and dishonest reigned supreme; the debt
was increased at a fearful rate—the right
of the people and the independence of Par-
liament were being destroyed. The speaker
showed how it was the political necessities
of the men in power, and not the require-
ments of the country's business that com-
pelled the creation of thirteen offices in the
Cabinet. As one result, they had a Minister
of Agriculture the useless occupier of an
utterly useless office, belonging to a man
150 miles below Quebec, whose knowledge
of agriculture might be judged from his op-
inion that the deep and long lying snow of
his district of country, enriched the ground
and was a great benefit to the farmer, (great
laughter.) The noble opportunity offered
for a fair start in 1857, and the outrageous
way it had been abused by the present
men, were enough when considered, to
arouse the indignation of every honest
man in Canada, let him be either Conser-
vative or Reformer. It was most provoking
to the people to think that abuses had been
introduced, which, as a former speaker had
remarked, would only without great diffi-
culty be corrected—if they could be correct-
ed—in any government that might succeed
in future time. In 1862 some 25 useless
officers, supposed to be engaged in collect-

ing the revenue, were dismissed by John
Sandfield, and what had afterwards hap-
pened? Why these very men constituted them-
selves into an engineering force for the
Tories, worked ever since to get their friends
into power and to keep them there, and now
John A. had got nearly every one of them
back at the public crib again. If their new
system failed, and truly he was not quite as
anguine about it as he once was, the blame
would lie with the men who had prostituted
a glorious national opportunity to their own
selfish ends, merely to keep themselves in
office. This was and should be a great Dis-
union, but corrupt men, suffered unfortu-
nately for a while to control its affairs, were
taking the sure way to sap its greatness. He
hoped, however, that the noble gathering
he saw there that day was indicative of what
the country would shortly do—of its speedy
dismissal of the men who were now so abus-
ing their high trust.
