The plaintiff's claim was under a will alleged to have been made by Mary alleged to have been made by Mary Lamb in favor of her father in 1889, and that Mary Lamb had acquired a good title by length of possession. The plaintiff's father had several children and died without a will. She claimed as one of his heirs. The defendant denied the plaintiff's title, and claimed the lot as his own under a deed from Bridget McGill, made to his brother in 1899, and alleged that Bridget McGill and her husband had had twenty years' possession of the lot. Mary Lamb, otherwise called "Granny Lamb," whose first husband was called Baker, was the mother of Thomas Baker, James Baker, and Bridget McGill. Many of the old residents of Guelph were examined as witnesses. The Judge decided every disputed yount of fact in favor of the plaintiff, but held that as the deed of 1869 from Bridget McGill was registered before "Granny" Lamb's will, the defendant was entitled to retain one-third of the lot. The other two-thirds be decided to be the property of the plaintiff and her sisters, as heirs-at-law of Thomas Baker, and he entered a verdict for the plaintiff for one-feurth of two-thirds of the lot, with costs.
