Mrs. Herrick, whose maiden name was Boughner, was born near St. Catharines. She was twice married, her first husband being the late Robert McKenney. They were among the first settlers in the 8th Concession of Malahide. Mr. McKenney was not strong, and upon his wife devolved much of the management of the farm and the care of the family, and most nobly she met her obligations. She was noted among her neighbors as a model housekeeper, mother, and nurse. After the death of Mr. McKenney, she moved to the village, and later married A. C. Herrick, who died about ten years ago. Always ambitious, she kept her own home, sometimes going to her children for the winter months. Last fall, realizing that she was failing, she went to live with her son. She was a lifelong member of the Methodist Church. Three children survive her: Hamilton and Frank McKenney, of Michigan, and Mrs. Wm. McLeister, of Glanworth. The remains were brought to her late home at Springfield on Thursday. The funeral, which was held at the house on Friday, was conducted by Revs. H. Wood and George Jewett. The pallbearers were George Muller, Major Connor, Andrew Nevill, Jos. Lindsay, G. W. Henry, and George Stewart. Mrs. Herrick's kindly word and love of sociability made hosts of friends for her, and all will sympathize with the bereaved family.

Tennis Balls and Racquets—at Caughell's.

Owing to the terrific rainstorm that swept over Sarnia and district last Thursday, the G.T.R. tunnel under the St. Clair River was put out of business, and no traffic of any kind was able to get through until Saturday morning. A fall of two inches an hour taxed the capacity of the reservoirs on the Port Huron side of the big tube and they finally overflowed. The leakage from the reservoirs, which were built to prevent any such event as occurred on Thursday at length wore away the containing walls and a great mass of water rushed into the tunnel. On the flat surface of the right-of-way under the river the depth at first was over four feet. Simultaneously the electric power which operates tunnel trains was cut off. Pumps were at once rushed to the cuts at the entrances to the tunnel and the work of clearing out the water began. Trains from the west were re-routed via Detroit. All freights were laid up. The flood condition meant an expense of thousands of dollars to the Grand Trunk Railway.
