

Looting by the Boers Has Actually Begun.

British Government Will Insist on Redress of the Uitlanders' Grievances.

Sir Wm. Harcourt's Views - Some Hopeful Signs.

Cape Town, Sept. 27.-In the Orange Free State there is feverish anxiety in all the departments, and the dispatch of riders, carrying instructions to towns removed from the telegraph

lines, is continuous. There is no official news from Bloemfontein, but there is not the slightest doubt about the attitude of the Orgovernment. Jews at a meeting resolved to do likewise, and offered to equip 200 men. Piet Kruger, grandson of the president of the Transvaal, in a letter to the Volkstein asks wether or not it is the government's duty to inform the imperial government that any further landing of troops will be considered a casus belli. Joubert is said to reckon that in the event of war he can muster from all

sources 50,000 men. READY TO FIGHT. A Pietermaritzburg dispatch says a number of Natal Boers, armed with

Mausers, are on the frontier, ready to fight. The British authorities will send a force to disarm or drive them across the frontier. A manifesto has been issued at Johannesburg by a number of Irishmen, urging the Irish to "strike a good blow

at England, which has held the Irish people in bondage."
A Cape Town dispatch says that advices from Pretoria are to the effect that the Boers are anxious to begin hostilities. They think the delay on the part of Great Britain indicates that she is afraid to use force. There is talk of deposing Gen. Joubert because he is using his influence

MUTINOUS MULETEERS. A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Pietermaritzburg, Natal, says that the colored muleteers at Ladysmith mutined and refused to go to the front with the artillery.

DELAY DANGEROUS. The Times has a dispatch from Joannesburg which asserts that the delay is creating the worst possible im-pression on the minds of the burghers, sequent to the meeting of the council who tauntingly declare that while great Eritain deprecates delay upon the part of the Boers, she intentionally and unnecessarily prolongs the con-troversy, because she is afraid to follow up her own game of bluff with

the argument of force. WAR INEVITABLE. The indications at the agency of the Transvaal Government in this city point to the belief that war is inevit-able. Preparations are being made for moving the furniture from the headquarters, and the gloomiest impression in regard to the outcome of the crisis appears to prevail. Mr. Montague White, the consul-general of the South African Republic in London, wished to return to Pretoria, but was informed by his government that in the event of war he would be more useful at

THE BOER REPLY. The Transvaal Government was in constant telegraphic communication with Bloemfontein, on the reply to Mr. Chamberlain's dispatch, it is expected the reply will protest against the continued dispatch of English troops as a menace to the Transvaal.
