The Colonies' Part in the War-Figaro Condemns Caricatures of the Queen -How Boers Desecrate Catholic

London, March 13.-The subscription lists for the "khakis," otherwise the British war loan of £30,000,000, closed for the town last night, and will close for the country tomorrow. It is understood that the loan was covered twenty times.

CARICATURES CONDEMNED. Paris, March 13.-Le Figaro reproduces a note of warning uttered by a statesman, whose name is not given, but one who is said to know the present state of opinion among the great powers with respect to the attitude of France toward Great Britain, and that the powers condemn the recent fensive French caricatures of Queen Victoria and such anti-British demonstrations as took place the other day

at Bordeaux. The statesman in question says: "Queen Victoria, who last year facilitated a settlement of many Anglo-French controversies in Africa, has profoundly modified her ideas during the last few weeks. This fact is known all over Europe, and is undeniable." He calls upon Frenchmen to be prudent.

BOERS VERSUS CATHOLICS. The following from a recent issue of the Cork News, shows how the Boers treat those holding religious views at variance with them. The respect shown by the British for what all classes hold sacred is in strong contrast to the foi-

tains an interesting account of what befell their convent and chapel at New-castle, in Northern Natal, on its cap-ture by the Boers. This letter will be looked for in vain in the columns of such prints as the Freeman's Journal and the Cork Examiner, though both organs would probably feel offended did anyone suggest that they are not, first and foremost, 'defenders of the faith,' regardless of other considera-tions. 'After having looted our convent and destroyed everything sacred therein, writes Sister Mary Reginald, 'the Boers vented all their rage on the chapel, breaking statues and crucifixes, destroying pictures and then trampling on them underfoot. It is awful to think of the flendish desecration they carried on in the house of God. And this is but the literal truth. It may not be generally known, but it is a fact, that by Kruger and his government the Catholics are hated, and but for the imperial government we would be liable on them underfoot. It is awful to think imperial government we would be liable to be sent out of the country. wondc: we honor the brave men who fight in our defense, and nobly fall in repelling the invader.' Why is it that all such testimony as we have quoted is carefully excluded from the columns of the Irish Nationalist newspapers? Is it lest it should give rise to a revulsion of feeling in the minds of the common people who have been misguided by the false teachings of our contemporaries?"

The financial cost of the war was not immediately altered by fluctuations of fallure or success. It would be rash at present to think that the number of months the British army would remain in South Africa was likely to be materially shortened. So the government estimates included what was tinue the efforts at full pressure for

another six months, and at half-pressure for six months thereafter. THE COLONIES' PART Continuing, Mr. Wyndham said he contemplated that the colonies would in future continue their military support of the empire on a systematic basis, and that they might live to see this new force revolutionize the problem of imperial defense. The colonies had not fulfilled a contract, but had obeyed the instinct of the imperial race. It might be that in the future the colonies would not only seek to perpetuate their present action, but would seek to render a repetition easier by some organization on prearranged lines. The speaker paid a high tribute to the heroism of the troops, who, he said, had so splendidly contributed to the deep-laid strategy of Lord Roberts.

THE 100TH REGIMENT. Mr. H. O. Arnold Forester asked whether advantage of the opportunity afforded by the raising of twelve new battarions would be taken to have the 100th Regiment repatriated as a distinctively Canadian regiment. Mr. Joseph Powell Williams, financial secretary of the war office, said that the matter of repatriation was a subject of correspondence at the pres-

ent moment, but that repatriation was not necessary in connection with the raising of the proposed battalions.

Sir Charles Dilke (Radical) complained that the military estimates were inadequate for home defense. Henry Campbell-Bannerman accepted the new proposals, but depre-cated making present necessities the test of Great Britain's true policy in naval and military matters.

LOSS OF THE CUVIER. It is now learned that the British steamer Cuvier was sunk in the Straits of Dover on the 9th by a steamer whose identity is not known. The three survivors, who were landed at Calais, France, shortly after the disaster, say a great hole was torn in the Cuvier, sinking her in less that five minutes. They further state that the 30 men comprising the crew were below at the time of the collision, and were unable to reach the docks so quickly did the rammed vessel go down, and that the colliding vessel paid no heed to the cries for assistence and steamed away. The captain and third mate were seen to jump from the bridge as their vessel went down. CABLE NOTES.
