Occurred in London, Eng., Yesterday

Morning—A Long and Useful Life Spent in the Civil Service in This City.

A cablegram from London, England, yesterday conveyed the intelligence of the death of Mr. R. J. C. Dawson, ex-postmaster of this city. The death occurred at his son's residence, Victoria Villa, 53 Queen's road, St. John's Wood, London, whither Mr. Dawson and his family went in May last to visit his son, who is in business there. THE BRITISH ELECTIONS

Manifesto of Salisbury and Other Leaders.

Premier Wants a Strong Majority in Parliament.

Harcourt Says the Cost of the Boer War Will Be Not Less Than \$500,000,000.

FIVE AUTHOR CANDIDATES

London, Sept. 24.—Conan Doyle, Gilbert Parker, Anthony Hope, James Barrie and Jerome K. Jerome, well-known authors, will stand as parliamentary candidates in the approaching general election.

COST OF THE BOER WAR.

Sir William Vernon Harcourt, in his election manifesto, says: "The result of the government policy is that we are now the best-hated country in the world, and burdened with the accumulated debt and an increased taxation. The cost of the war will not fall short of £100,000,000."

GOSCHEN RETIRES.

Mr. George Joachim Goschen, first lord of the admiralty and member of the House of Commons for St. George's, Hanover, Square, London, announces that he will not seek re-election to parliament.

MORLEY'S MANIFESTO.

John Morley, Liberal member for Monrovia, in his manifesto, declares that his opinion has not changed, that everything might have been attained in South Africa without war. "In a single year," he says, "the work of a generation in uniting the Dutch and English in South Africa has been undone, and not even in Ireland has the difficult race problem been more miserably mishandled." Mr. Morley admits, however, that it is impossible to revoke the proclamation of annexation.

LORD ROSEBERRY.

The Earl of Rosebery, issuing a manifesto, in the form of a letter to a Liberal candidate, says: "In the present situation of the world I would vote for almost any strong administration, but the present government are strong only in votes. In other respects they are the weakest government I can recollect." After enumerating the government's "failures at home and abroad," Lord Rosebery criticizes the conduct of the South African war, declaring that it has "exposed England to humiliation," and "paralysed in our history since the American war."

LORD SALISBURY.

Lord Salisbury's manifesto emphasizes the necessity that the Queen's government should be supported by a strong parliamentary majority as "the only means of convincing the inhabitants of the conquered South African territories that there is no hope of diverting the government from their policy by persistent resistance of agitation."

After remarking that "all the recent troubles in South Africa have been due to a shift of parliamentary opinion at a critical moment," the prime minister goes on to say: "It will depend upon the disposition and conduct of the Boers how long an interval is to elapse before their full position as a British colony is attained. The brilliant success of Lord Roberts' army must not blind us to the imperfections disclosed in our own defensive armor—imperfections which but for the war might have remained unnoticed. It will be the urgent duty of parliament and the government to remove these defects—a duty which certainly could not be discharged by a ministry depending upon a broken party."

In conclusion, Lord Salisbury refers to China as a "difficulty," among others, confronting the government, and requiring that the government should be armed with a strong majority in the House of Commons. He urged that, in view of all these considerations, there should be no abstentions at the polls.
