and lawns is a live subject in London and as the Civic Improvement Society has added an impetus to the laudable work by offering prizes for the bestkept gardens and lawns, the work will no doubt be carried out with vigor this ummer, Of course, all cannot expect to win the prizes, nor is it likely all will care to enter into the competition, but those who labor to improve their premises will be amply rewarded if they receive no more than the satisfaction they will enjoy from the observation of their well-kept lawns and gardens and flowers-for things of beauty are joys

forever. Those who would improve their premses have no time to lose, for the spring is rapidly passing. Consequently a few suggestions may be of interest, and service, to many Londoners just now.

About Stips. To get slips and root them is a pretty sure way to have plants, if one under stands them, and attends faithfully to

all their needs. There is no such thing as "luck" in raising plants. They call for intelligent care and will respond nobly. But there more pleasure and delight in sowing the seed and watching them grow and bloom than is obtained in any other way. Abutilons, begonias, lantanas, heliotrope, vines, lobelias, sweet alyssum and ageratums are all good window-garden flowers and easily raised from seed.

Little boxes about 9 inches long. or 5 inches wide, and 3 inches in depth. or even shallow cigar-boxes, are the best to sow seed in. Any good garden soil is suitable, although three parts andy loam to one part wood soil is

Sift the soil through a coarse sieve. fill the box and rap on it gently to settle the soil, then press it lightly and evenly with the hand, leaving a good TION: Vocal and Physical Culture.
