RACE AND CREED.

At intervals, when business is slack, some of the Conservative papers get up a "race and creed" agitation. Of course, they don't put it that way. They pick out an article in some Quebec paper and using it as a text, accuse these wicked Frenchmen of stirring up this race and creed business in order to help Laurier. They blame the other party and proceed to do all they charge the other party with doing. They are having a spell of that kind now.

A short time ago La Presse, a paper formerly Conservative, but now claiming to be an independent supporter of the Government, appealed to Conservatives in Quebec to get away from the Orange-Tory faction that never loses an opportunity to oppose the Catholic Church. That is what might naturally be expected from a French Canadian paper. If extreme Protestants will parade their antagonism to Catholics, they must expect the latter to strike back. In the course of its article La Presse took occasion to express its views on imperialism, which are much the same as those of Mr. Monk, the Quebec leader of the Conservatives, and also to condemn the proposition to offer breadstuffs to Britain, which is the view held by many Ontario papers, and by Sir Charles Bessborough, late commander of the British navy. Of course, this was a chance not to be neglected; and so La Presse is held up as fighting a "race and creed" battle.

These hysterical outbreaks of Conservative papers are not new. They have occurred before. Fortunately, they have not done much harm, because their object is generally understood. No man in Canada ever did more to harmonize races and creeds and to keep these matters out of politics than Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and the people know it. That has been a element in his success as a Canadian statesman. That there are some French Catholics who are bigoted as some English Protestants is, doubtless, quite true. But it must be said for the Quebec supporters of Sir Wilfrid that, as a class, they have adopted his policy, and followed his example. The temptation to adopt another line is probably strong, when they hear of resolutions passed in Orange conventions, and read some of the articles in Conservative papers. But if our pro-Protestant Conservative friends would moderate their own enthusiasm and tone down their own language, there would be less race and creed agitation.

So far as the imperialistic views of La Presse are concerned, that paper has the same right to hold them that any one else has; and the same right to utter them. The paper is read by the Quebec people; if its opinions are bad they certainly will influence people in Ontario who do not read the paper and will never hear of them if they were not enlightened by the diatribes of the Mail-Enterprise-News combinations. If these latter would refrain from carrying on race and creed crusades under the guise of re-proving Quebec sinners, they would exhibit that higher type of patriotism and of Christianity, which they profess to admire.

CANADIAN INVESTMENTS AND OTHERS.

It cannot be gratifying to Canadians to find great British concerns, like the Standard Life Assurance Company, of Edinburgh, with millions already invested in this country, sending a representative over here to invest millions more. The investments of that company in Western Canada, it is estimated, amount to \$17,000,000, and so satisfied are the directors that they are both safe and profitable, that the general manager of the company, Mr. I. W. Dickson, now in the west for the purpose of increasing the amount invested. In marked contrast with this is the course followed by Canadian capitalists, like Mr. William Mackenzie, who have been in the habit of going to London to borrow money for Canadian enterprises, while at the same time investing in electric and street railway enterprises in Mexico and South America. Commenting on this the Winnipeg Free Press says:

"It must appear to Britishers like Mr. Dickson somewhat strange that leading Canadians should be using their capital and directing other Canadian capital to enterprises in Mexico and South America, when there are so many opportunities for using it to advantage in Canada. It may be that the Canadians who are

playing so important a part in the development of Mexico, Cuba, Brazil and Venezuela find it possible to borrow money in London upon the endorsement of bonds by the provincial governments of Canada, whereas the governments of the governments of other countries in which they operate does not make securities so easy to negotiate. They thus exploit Canada with British money, but reserve the higher rate of earnings obtained in foreign enterprise for their own money. In doing this individuals can claim that they have a perfect right to invest their money where it yields to them the best results. But the same reason cannot be accepted from institutions that control the savings of the people and are granted privileges under the laws of the Dominion. Upon the men who direct the trend of investment of British money, the fact of Canadian domestic capital being invested abroad to so large an extent must leave the impression that eminent Canadians know of a better place to put their money than their own country."

While it is to be regretted that so much Canadian money is being devoted to the development of foreign countries, it is encouraging to know that British institutions like that represented by Mr. Dickson, profiting from experience, are sending over more of their surplus capital for investment in Canada.

A MASSACHUSETTS PENSION SCHEME.

The Government of the state of Massachusetts has just inaugurated a workmen's pension system from which important results are expected. The operation of the scheme will for the present be confined to the 27,000 employees of the Boston and Maine Railway, at whose request the system has been established, and if it proves as successful as its originators expect, it will be extended to all public service and private corporations, probably with the addition of accident and invalidity insurance.

The system, which possesses some novel features, was put into effect after a favorable decision of the railway company, and a vote of the employees. A two-thirds majority is required, but the vote taken showed it was favored by all except a very small number. The system then became compulsory on all future employees of the road and on all present employees except such as both voted against it and within three months gave written notice of their desire to be excluded. With these exceptions the company's employees will hereafter participate in a compulsory pension system, their contributions to the pension fund being regularly deducted from their wages.

The company and the employees contribute equally, so that in that respect the system is co-operative. So, too, as regards management—one-half of the board of trustees representing the company and the other half the employees. As, however, the company has to make up any deficiency necessary to assure a minimum annual payment of \$200 to any beneficiary, there will at the start be a slightly disproportionate burden upon the company, and in addition it is to make voluntary special contributions for the benefit of the older employees who have been long in the company's service.

A feature of the system that is both novel and important is that it gives the employee a legal right to his interest. In the event of his leaving the company's employ he receives back the amount of his contributions in full. The pension rights are to be inalienable and exempt from taxation. If desirous of so doing an employee may purchase annuity rights by voluntary contributions. In addition to the ordinary pension. The state exercises control through two of its officials, the state insurance commissioner and the state auditor.

Massachusetts is in advance of all the states of the republic in legislation of this character. Its insurance and banking laws have high standing; its standards for investments by savings banks are a model for other states, and its savings bank insurance system is very highly spoken of. The testing of this latest innovation will doubtless be watched with interest.

JAMES J. JEFFRIES BOXED SAM BERGER

JEFF SPEAKS.

In addressing the crowd the champion said:
"I see Johnson is talking a lot. I had hopes he was in earnest some days since, when he announced he would be at the ringside June 15 to see how I did, and that he would ask me some questions. I find he was four-fushing, as usual, and didn't intend to come. I would like to have told him in front of the crowd just what I thought of him and his ways. 'I want to meet that black fellow more than I ever wanted to fight any living man. He has no business with that title. I have always been afraid of my own strength in the ring, for fear I would kill a man, but I will have no such fear when I get into the ring with this fellow. For the first time in my life I will then hit a man with all the force that is in me. 'I think Ketchel has given too much away to this big black, and I don't think Ketchel can beat him. I hope, however, that when Ketchel meets Johnson, he kills him. In six weeks my theatrical engagement will be over, and then I will talk to this black about a fight."
