



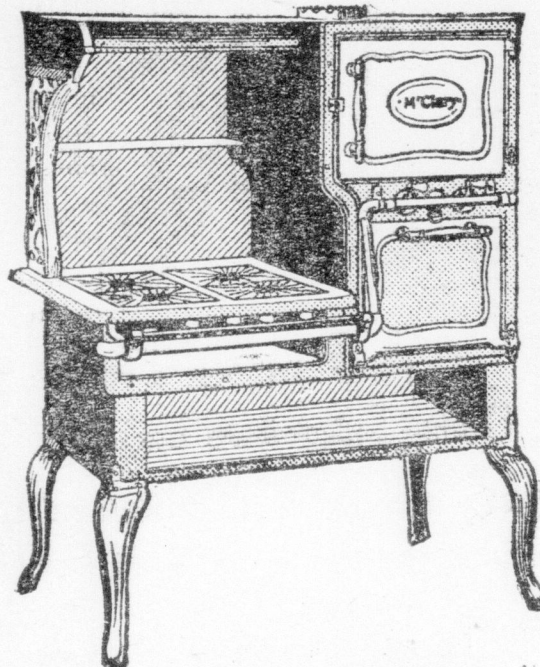

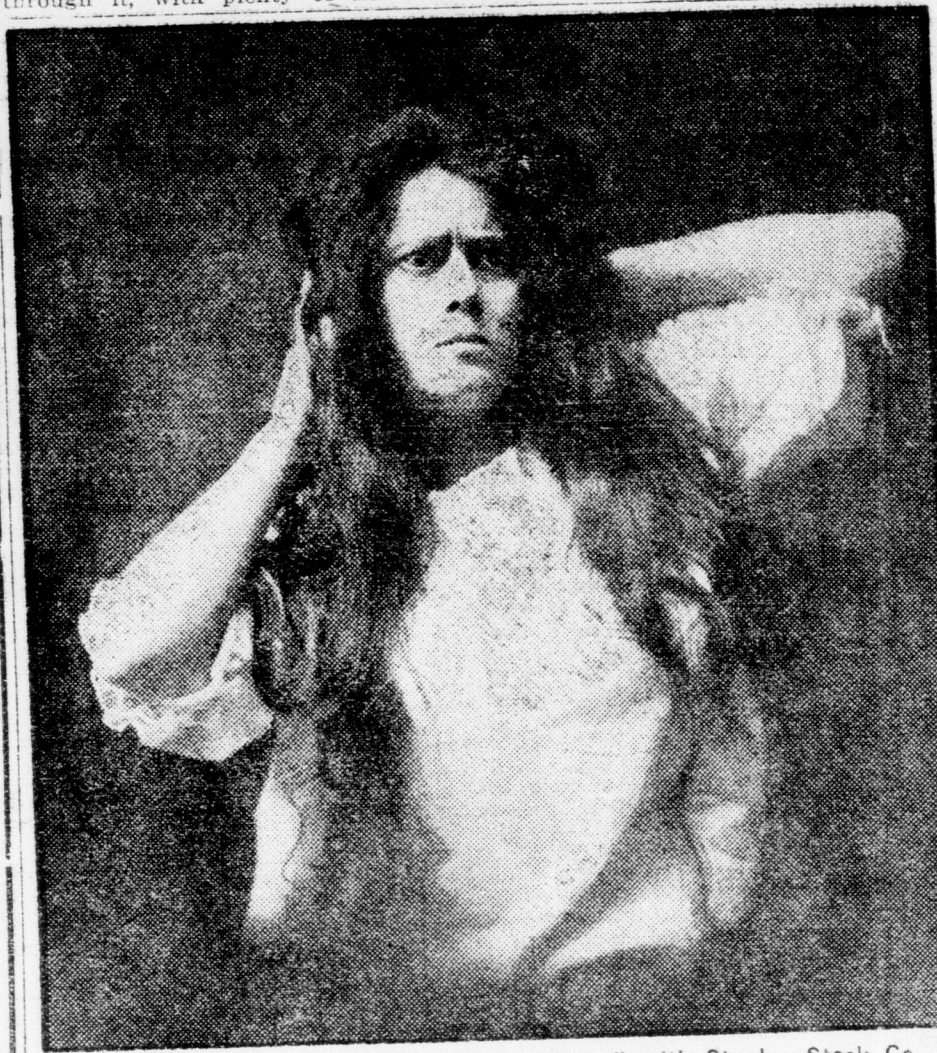

### Fortune Finds Him After Long Search

James Muirhead Is Located By His Foster-Mother, Who Is Now Wealthy.

Toronto, May 23.—A search of many years has been rewarded by the location of James Muirhead working in a barber shop on Richmond street. Over 30 years ago he had been adopted by a couple in Wellington County, and after they had gone away he had not heard of them again until upon request of the police he was located this week.

Prospering during her sojourn in the west, Mrs. Jennie Walker, the foster-mother, had not forgotten her charge and though now he is well up in years she wants to do what she can for him.

Muirhead has written to Mrs. Walker, but has not yet received a reply. The story he tells himself is as follows:

Back in 1875 a little orphan boy of 10 years of age, James Muirhead had been brought out from London by a charitable organization and put in the Galt Orphanage. He was adopted by Mr. and Mrs. Avrey, of Garafaxa Township, Wellington County, and living with them for two years they went away and the little lad was left with Mr. David Avrey, of Erin Township, father of his foster parent. With him he lived until he was 19 years of age. For him it was an abundance of work and no money, for the average farmer does not see the necessity of turning over to his sons or foster-sons any of the emoluments of toil. Disgusted with his position as a hewer of wood only, without any compensation, he left his foster-home and going to Elora learned to some slight extent at least how to shear the locks and scrape the faces of the people of that burg. From there he came to Toronto, and according to his story he has been in Toronto since 1888, working at his trade. For some 12 years he was in one shop, at another time with a place of his own. Mr. Muirhead says that he did not run away

from his home as reported, and has not been wandering around the face of the earth, but has been in the city the greater part of the time.

After Mr. and Mrs. Avrey moved away he had not heard from them at all, but from the communications to the police he understood that Mr. Avrey had died and she had married a Mr. Walker, and was now living in Oregon.

### MLLE. PAZ FERRER IS DEAD AT PARIS

Became Famous Through Her Won-derful Work in Role of Camille.

Paris, May 22.—Strangely like the passing of "Camille," which was her favorite and most popular role, death came today to Mlle. Paz Ferrer, one of France's most beautiful actresses, at Fontainebleau, and the announcement of her demise was the first the public knew that she had been sick.

Mlle. Ferrer was the favorite daughter of Ferrer, the labor leader who was executed in Spain, and the tragedy left the girl heartbroken.

She was 22 years old and constant grieving undermined her health. Tuberculosis attacked her, but she said nothing about it except to intimate friends, and they were sworn to secrecy. Wasting away, the young actress kept on with her work at the Odeon until she could work no longer, and then retired to Fontainebleau "for a rest."

Her "Camille" delighted Paris more than any other "Camille" save that of Mme. Bernhardt, and that she followed the role in death as in life struck her admirers as remarkable.

### RAILWAY LOST IN LONG-FOUGHT ACTION

Contested Suit Brought by Widow of Engineer for \$6,000.

New York, May 23.—The New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad was defeated today in a suit brought to hold it accountable for the death of Arthur M. Curtis, engineer of the Federal Express, when that train was wrecked on July 11, 1911, near Bridgeport, Conn.

A jury in the supreme court awarded a judgment for \$6,000 against the railroad to the engineer's widow. The wreck in question caused 15 deaths, and was the subject of investigation by the coroner and the interstate commerce commission.

The railroad contested the suit very vigorously because it contended that Curtis failed to regard the signals, which told him to slow down at the cross-over where his train left the track.

### MIGHT CAUSE WAR

Mexican Leader Warns Financiers Against Making Proposed Loan.

Eagle Pass, Texas, May 23.—In a statement today during a conference of his military advisers, Governor Carranza, the Mexican constitutional leader, announced he had cabled to the "prime ministers" of Great Britain and France, warning them of complications if European capitalists negotiate the Huerta loan, and pledge customs receipts.

He cabled that if the constitutional movement succeeds, an attempt by England or France to collect this loan might provoke war with Mexico. He asked the ministers to make his statement public.
