Cotton crepe in a soft shade of pink or blue, or in cream white, with a plaiting of self material or wash ribbon, would be very nice for this. A simpler finish would be to bind the edges with ribbon or satin, or to ornament with feather stitching. Dimity, lawn, organdie, batiste, cashmere, crepe de chine, silk or voile, are also suitable for this style of garment. The model is pretty and comfortable, and very easy to develop. The bell sleeve is cool and dainty but for warmth the bishop style may be preferred. The pattern is cut in six sizes, 34, 36, 38, 40, 42 and 44 inches bust measure. It requires 3% yards of 36-inch material for a 36-inch size.
