REPUDIATES BLAME FOR SOVIET NOTE LEAK

British Foreign Office Claims Russians Responsible For Exposure.

London, May 10 .- The British forign office repudiates the suggestion that any official in its service was for the leak of the contents of the note to Soviet Russia to labor organizations before it had been despatched.
